It is not a football club, but many readers hope that the grounds would become the hore field or WANDERERS.

NOT FOR DRUNKS

Blacks want to get away from the racist hotels , to a place where we can relax and feel at one. Where we make our own rules to suit ourselves. The club is a family place, not for drunks. In one side is a large children's playground and upstairs is all dry area (no Alcohol).

On the ground level is a lounge/dance hall and members bar and beer garden Membership is to be open to any colour but anyone who does not know how to behave loses their membership.

The Kalalak people were worried when news came on the radio that the NT Government was going to take back the Gurindji land. The NT Government had written the Gurindji a letter warning them that their cattle station had not kept to the lease agreements.

The Kalalak people had good reason to be worried. They also have a lease agreement which Paul Everingham pushed them to sign last year. It is a very tough one-sided agreement.

Like the Gurindji, the Larrakia have land, but no rights.

For the record, below is printed, in simple words, all the things the Gwalwa Daraniki Assoc iation Inc agreed to do when they signed the Kalalak lease (lot 5182 and lot 8630 - 301 hectares).

- (a) The government people have a 'reasonable" right to inspect the land.
- (b) The government keeps the power to let anyone mine for minerals on the land.

(c) The government can take back any part of the land (resumption).

- (d) Sewerage, water, electricity and drains that cross the land can be inspected fixed and so on.
- (e) Rent is ten cents each year.
- (f) The land can be handed back, or the land can be taken back if the Gwalwa Daraniki Association does not do any of these fifteen things printed below....
- 1. Pay the rent one year in advance.
- 2. Use the land only in the way agreed (Special Community Development).
- 3.Pay any rates and taxes.
- 4. Keep to the usual laws for leases (Ordinances).
- 5. By $\dot{\theta}$ ctober first 1981 there must be at least one toilet/shower building costing not less than \$10,000 and this building must be kept in good condition.
- 6. The land must be planted with trees and bushes (landscaped) the natural bush is counted as landscaped.
- 7. Any boundary fences must be approved by the minister. Any fence should be kept in good condition.
- 8. People should not cut down or destroy any live natural trees in the lease area.
- 9. Drawingsof any new works , to show how the area will look, must be given to the Planning Branch for approval before the building plans go to the Building Authority for approval.
- 10. By April the first 1980, the GDA must pull down any "structure" (any sort of building?) that the Building Authority does not like. (The Minister can give more time).
- 11. Aborigines will not interfer with work on the new connector road.
- 12. The GDA will checkup with the Department of Transport and works for the safest place for entrances to the land.
- 13. By October 1st 1980 any Kalalak roads or parking areas should be finished showing where vehicles can or cannot go. These roads should be at least formed and gravelled. The time limit can be extended.
- 14. The narrow beach, as marked on the lease map, is a public right-of-way (footpath) Note: the sea boundary of Kalalak is not the high or low tide mark, but the outside edge of the
- THE NT GOVERNMENT AGREED TO DO ONLY ONE THING. IT IS......
- 15. The Government will put up "substantial" fencing on both sides of that part of the new highway that cuts across Kalalak. They will also look after the fence.

This lease agreement was signed on 3rd August 1979 by F.Fogarty, A.L.Treves, Bobby Secretary, Kathleen Secretary Topsy Secretary, for the community.

The Larrakia did not ask for land to rip it up to make money as the Europeans do. That is why they will need help to keep to these rules for the lease. The only rule which came from the people's side was rule eight, the rest are government ideas.

LOGAL NEWS

NO CAMPING AT BAGOT SAYS COUNCIL.

The Bagot Community Council is sending out letters to all settlements making clear that Bagot is not for camping when you come to town-Too many visitors have made life too hard for the permanent residents and their school children, says the council.

A large crowd were at the funeral of our brother JOHNNY FEJO, who died last November at the age of 37. Johnny was one of the first members of the Gwalwa Daraniki and travelled to Brisbane in January 1972 to tell everyone about the fight for Larrakia lands. He lived in a humpy at the Kalalak camp until the day he died.

OLD BAGOT CEMETERY.

ALICE SPRINGS STANDS STRONG TOGETHER.

There are at least nine leases for camps in Alice Springs but only three in Darwin. This is not because Alice Springs needs more. In Darwin, Michael Baluka's group tried hard to get a camp. The Catholic Missions also need a place.

In Alice Springs, the tribes speak in a strong united voice through the Central Congress and the TANGATJIRA COUNCIL. These organisations work for the welfare of the people and their awakening In Darwin there is only the Aboriginal Development Foundation. This organisation lives off the peoples poverty and ignorance of what is going on

NOTHING LEFT FOR THE CAMPS.

There was a story in the newspaper last year that told us for the first time, how much money the Aboriginal Development Foundation has, and how they spend the money.

Well, in the newspapers, the ADF said it had no money for the camps' improvements. After paying ADF wages, office rent and vehicle expenses there is not much left for anything else.

HUNGRY CHILDREN IN DARWIN.

In town there are too many kids going hungry or eating just bread and sweet tea. Even the "health clinics" turn people away.

This is because Mr Fraser's government is for the rich. Aborigines hate Mr Fraser's government, because blacks are not rich. They cannot be rich while any of their brothers and sisters are in need. RICH PEOPLE ARE CRIMINALS - there is no difference at all. Mr Fraser's government is by criminals for criminals.

KALALAK BANTUSTAN BECOMES A SWAMP.

The Government is looking around for place build a few more camps in the new Kalalak Bantustan.

They will need to go by boat. This wet se KAlalak is a huge swamp, which is the very reason the whites gave back this area. In the old days the Larrakia tribe would net camp in the swamp. They moved to the high ground. The high land is now the most value in Darwin, for the big fancy houses.

Gundal is one important Larrakia place high ground. The history of that land claum shows us that the settlers will not return high ground easily.

BANJI OR BUNJI ???

This month we go back to spelling our name as BUNJI. Our change to BANJI was getting as one mixed up.

There is a tribal word , banji, which mean brother-in-law. This word is spelt with a "a" because in Aboriginal words, the "a" is always said like in "lubra".

But in towns, the old word banji has be to a popular slang word for "mate or friend" It is this slang of the English language we use for our title. It is spelt bunji with the "u" sound like in "bunyip".

ITS TIME FOR OUR OWN ABORIGINAL CLUB IN DARWIN.....

Johnny was sitting on the footpath outside the Parap Hotel. He had been thrown out for having no thongs, singing in the beer garden and being broke as well.

Yesterday Johnny had spent one hundred dollars in that bar until his bag had been stolen with everything in it. Like most of Darwin's black bars, the Parap is a pig yard where blacks get treated like pigs too.

Johnny's troubles would not be so bad if Darwin had a good Aboriginal Club. In our own club, we make the rules to suit our own style and needs. Think of the Yacht Club where you can sit around in swimming costume and enjoy a beer in the shade, or the German Club where you can sing folk songs to your hearts content, without hassles.

Our own club has not been built yet but here are some of the plans, a pleasant place where the money we spend goes back to the members, where there's so much going on that you will be too busy enjoying yourself to get drunk.

BUILDINGS: The new club will be well designed to suit the various needs of Aborigines living in, and visiting Darwin. The plan will include several bars and large shady beer gardens. The Decoration inside this club will make you proud of our long history.

WHERE ?: The Kalalak lease, on the large flat area called the old Ludmilla dump.

This is behind Bagot on the west of the new connector highway, well away from housing and handy for transport. There is a pedestrian subway there and plenty of space without interference to the Kalalak environment.

WHEN ?: Lets start things moving now- hold a meeting, incorporate an association etc so that the club can begin stage one next year.

HOW ?: The club profits will pay back the loan that will be necessary to get started.

NOT JUST GROG: A good club isn't just for selling grog, which as you know has caused a lot of problems in our community.

SPORTS: All around the club buildings will be sports fields of every kind both for club use and hire to the general public. There must be plenty of blacks who aren't involved in sport who can help start a few club sides. Included will be change rooms, lockers, showers and laundry.

FAMILY: The club will encourage a family atmosphere and involve women right from the top. In the dry areas will be childrens playround, trampolines, swimming pool, pinball, snack bar, TV, library.

ACTIVITIES: Regular dances, entertainers, films, sports training, meetings and conferences, TV, and GOOD COUNTER MEALS. etc etc juke boxes, rehearsals (music)
