REGISTER OF ABORIGINAL LAND INTERESTS

A great deal of interest was generated from the Chairman's message about the Registry of Aboriginal Land June/July edition.

Since the Land Councils were brought into being by the Aboriginal Land Rights (Northern Territory) Act 1976 and work within its charter, it is necessary that they implement it.

Section 24 of the Aberiginal Land Rights Act notes:

A Land Council shall compile and maintain, a register setting

(a) the names of the persons who, in the opinion of the Council, are the traditional Aboriginal owners of Aboriginal land in the area of the Land Council; and

(b) in relation to each group of traditional Aboriginal owners, a map or other references showing the sites belonging to them in so far as such can be done without breach of Aboriginal usage.

Because the Register of Aboriginal Land Interests is an important part of the Land Rights Act it is in the interests of the Aboriginal people of the Northern Territory that the Land Councils impliment it.

The November 1982 Issue of BUNJ! asked all tribes to stop the register of "traditional Owners". The first thing the new chairperson should do is to burn the register. Land Rights News, number 32, 1983, makes excuses for the register by hiding behind whiteman law: On the left is what the NLC says in thoir newspaper, Land Rights News. (They have changed the name of the register make it sound better).

VISITORS

OF THE PEOPLE CALLED "TRANSIENTS". JUST PEOPLE BUNJI MET ON THE CONTROL

Colin was sitting on the kerb outside Uncle Sams. He is 29 years old and from Bathurst Island. "I go back on Morday", he said, proudly showing his pasto the nearby Army Barracks where he was staying as a member of Norforce training team. Several times as we talked he opened his wallet to prove to his friends that he was broke. "When I get my pay, I'll go to the Maranga to play some pool", he said: "I used to play, football for St Marys. They would fly us here every Saturday, morning and back every Sunday".

Billy, age 19 "My real name, bush name, is Guyprulawuy. I came from Maningrida last Tuesday for having a good holiday in Darwin My girlfriend is got to come here in a couple of weeks to have a baby After that we planning when she ready we run away together to Snake Bay. I like to find a job in Darwin but she frightened of Darwin. I am camping at back of Aboriginal Hostel, near the park. Eight of us there, we have a shower at the toilet next to Tiwi Shopping Centre. I got no money to stay in hostel. I just bring \$300 and share it with my friends:"

Roger , age 28. "My wife and I saved \$2000 from playing cards. We wanted to come to Darwin to do some shopping and also the Council is a bit slack back home First I rang my friend at Darwin Aboriginal Legal Aid and sho said we could stay at her place.

Since we flew here, I have bought

a racing bike to get around and my wife bought clothes. We look after

our money but sometimes I go to the Marrara Hotel to play pool. I have been looking for a job and I get U/B. Before I worked for the YMCA at Maningrida and here. If I get a job I will stay here unless my family asks me to go back for tribal ceremony. I really want to get a flat but the rent is too much in Darwin.

Steven, 23, is from Roper River but now lives at Galiwinku He admits he is "a jailbird", and likes a drink. "Idont like my missus to see me drunk" he said."I respect my wife. I respect my baby I married a girl from Elcho! We have one kid and look after another three. My missus is going back from Darwin Hospital on Monday. I got locked up and lost my ticket. Maybe my mother in law will book my seat. If not, who cares, In town, I live the same as other Aboriginal people, under the sky. First at Berrimah crossroad, but too much trouble there. Now with Elcho mob at Winnellie. We live on one blanket, four or six men. Steven complained about the Gordon Symons Hostel but he was too drunk to make his point clearly.

A group of men were sitting in the shade on the lawns next to the Uniting church. They were from "somewhere in North East Arnhem land".

"I flew by Airnorth to Darwin to go to court in Katherine next week," says one. Charter would cost too much. Istayed at Tiwi Lodge with friends and now I live anywhere. It is a hard time here, money side and feed side.

My court case is about a fight with police at 'Signboard' on Bamyili road last, month. That is where the people drink.

Tomorrow I will go to Katherine and from bliere, hitchhike to Roper River.

It was a great day for the Redfern-Chippendale area on 10 October when yet another Aboriginal dream came true. Although there are Aboriginal general stores and co-operatives elsewhere in Australia, usually in isolated places, the Black Market is the first commercially owned and operated Aboriginal supermarket in Australia competing in an inner city position in an Aboriginal heartland.



The smart exterior of the new supermarket in Louis Street, Chappendale, with the sign and awning in the colours of the Aboriginal lies, Alongside are some of the houses remarked for Aboriginal tenants by the Aboriginal Housing Company.

The opening of the supermarket was performed by Charles Perkins, chairman of the Aboriginal

Development Commission (ADC), and by Paul Coe, chairman of the Aboriginal Legal Service Ltd, both of whom have been prominently involved right from the start of the Aboriginal advancement movement, yet the start of the Aboriginal advancement movement, yet the start of the Aboriginal advancement movement.

Funding for the project came from the ADC — with a grant of \$40,000 for renovations of the building, and a business loan of \$95,000.

Paul Coe, before the joint cutting of the celebration cake, declared that "Redfern had always for I libs way in Abruighed Alfairs".

"If we ever get land rights we'll be seeing black supermarkels and stores, and clubs; in places like Walgett, Bourke, Moree, Brewarrina, and all the other Aboriginal towns", he said.

Just a note to report on a development occurring in the Pilbara region. I have heard previously of the experiment taking place from Strelley to rehabilitate alcoholic Aborigines caught in the fringe dwellers situation. They are refered to as "broken people".

Relatives pick them up in Port Hedland after pension day, when they are drunk and transport them into the Great Sandy Desert where they originally came from.

Inthis extremely isolated region there is a reliable supply of water and a community of about 160 has evolved.

Away from alcohol and in an environment

they are familiar with, these people are soon rehabilitated.
Supplies are regularly taken to them.
Melons and vegetables are being cultivated.


In such an arid region, lizards are a staple diet. Kangaroos even are scarce. Only found in areas of some vegetation which are few and far between. If they are lucky, a camel falls into their hands.



BANTUSTANS

If Africans are not needed in the 'white' areas, they are forced to live in overcrowded and barren Bantustans!

Hundreds of thousands of black people have been uprooted from their homes and forced to move to these areas because of the government's apartheid policies, often to make way for white residents.

The Bantustans are used as dumping grounds for those Africans not needed by the 'white' economy—widows, retired people and the unemployed of all ages; people who the Deputy Minister of Bantu Affairs referred to in 1969 as superfluous appendages'. About one-third of the entire African population live in Bantustans.

Starvation and disease are widespread in these areas. A World Health Organisation investigation showed that half the babies in a typical African Bantustan die before they reach the age of five.

Because of poverty men have to go to the white cities and

farms to try to carn money for their families of the whites but by Officially the Bantustans are ruled not by the whites but by traditional chiefs. These men are appointed and paid by the South African government and their rule is often just as repressive. The supposedly 'independent' Bantustans of the Transkei and Bophutha Tswana are not in reality independent at all—they are completely under South Africa's economic and political control.

Africans have voting 'rights' in these areas, but these are meaningless. Half the members of the bantusian 'parliaments' are selected by the South African government. Opposition groups are harrassed and banned.

These areas are also referred to as reserves or officially, as "homelands".

CAMPS PLANNED FOR

Kulaluk manager for the Gwala Daraniki Association Mr Richard Baugh, says that the proposed transient camps for temporary Aboriginal visitors to Darwin will definitely go ahead on the big lease area of Kulaluk.

Mr Baugh said that Mr Day's claim that the transient camps could be compared to "concentration camps" was absolute nonsense. He said that no transient could beforced to camp at Kulatuk. The facility would be there and he believed all or almost all transients would be glad of them. They would not be behind barbed wire fences nor would armed guards be patrolling the area like "concentration camps" as Mr Day suggested.

The lack of such a facility was largely responsible for complaints from the general public of small temporary, some not all that temporary, camps springing up in areas around the outskirts of Darwin.

Some temporary camps are actually set up not a great distance from the city centre.

"These people must have somewhere to go that is properly organised." said Mr Baugh.

DATED THIS JRD DAY OF MAY, 1983:

TRIBES GATHER AT LAJAMANU FOR CULTURE FESTIVAL.

The Festival opened with long lines of eastern Arnhem Landers, spears held above their heads, advancing through the community to the Festival ground. The other northerners and the Desert people watched from the shelter of the long lines of bough shades.

Each afternoon, the dancing began and continued till late at night, four or five different groups sharing the ground together at any one time. More and more different dancers were brought out by each group.

On the closing night, the Desert turned on a sight to amaze the northerners. Boys and girls, teenagers, men and women, from young to old, danced their way onto the ground and performed public sections of the Wolungarri initiation ceremony, which has come across from the Fitzroy River in the Kimber-ley in recent years. Scores Scores of spears flashed as the lines of dancers coiled and uncoiled like mighty snakes.



Bobby Japaljarri Leo in the dance dreamed by Liddie Nakamarra at Lajamanu in 1967. This dance tells the story of a man who broke the law and was tracked down and killed by tribal warriors in the country called Jundu, 300 miles south of Lajamanu.

That last, long night, the dancers of all the groups kept going strongly, in huge numbers. Around the danceground, fires were burning in the bitterly cold Desert night. The dancers and singers would not slow down! Maurice Luther s. at the Leaders' Boughshade with Nandjiwarra Amagula and Gawirrin Gumana, all three members of the Cultural Foundation's Executive. Using the microphone, all three gave quiet encouragement and good-humoured comments that added to the dancers' pride and joy.

Fears of strange and distant territory were set aside for the occasion; and there grew a feeling of an enormous tribal 'community', and yet, at the same time, there was deep pride in each group's ownership of its own particular traditions.

At eight o'clock on that final morning, the Desert men, women and children performed a <u>Baiyungarri</u> as a "goodbye" dance for all the visitors, who stood around the edge of the ground to receive the farewell.

In response, each of the visiting groups circled the ground in turn, dancing, and singing and shaking hands with their Desert hosts. There was many a tear shed in the farewells, after so much sharing of history in the making.
