Darwin Aborigines squat in front of peak-hour traffic - for the second time within a month as a protest against the Federal Government's refusal to give them rights to "tribal land".

Twenty-nine Aborigines blocked the morning traffic in Bagot Road for 15 minutes before police arrived and told them to move to the side of the

Traffic banked up for almost half a mile. Members of the Larrakai tribe are claiming an area known as Kulaluk which, they said, was of ceremonial significance and included a tribal burial ground.

A spokesman for the natives, Mr. Johnny Rejo, said: "We want Kulaluk. This is our land, Larrakia land, and the Larrakias have a right to

The Aborigines have sent a deputation to the Administrator and have written to the Minister for the Interior (Mr. Hunt) asking that the land be handed over to the Larrakias.

They are camped in tin shanties and tents on the disputed land.
