Couple reveal anguish of surrogacy barriers



NO mountain is too high, valley too deep or river wide enough for a pair of Territory lovers who continue to jump through hoops to realise their dream of becoming parents.

Nhulunbuy residents Brendan and Shanyn Vanderham, 28 and 36, who have struggled over the past decade to conceive their own babies, want laws introduced to make surrogacy possible in the Northern Territory.

After many failed IVF attempts, setbacks with overseas adoptions, surrogacy research, trips to fertility specialists, and more than \$150,000 spent on pursuing their dreams, Ms Vanderham's sister-in-law offered to be a surrogate.

But Ms Vanderham said that she was informed by a fertility specialist that she was ineligible to take part in a surrogacy because she wasn't infertile.

Surrogacy Australia chief executive Rachel Kunde said NT IVF clinics were not engaging in surrogacy despite there not being any laws governing NT surrogacy.

"Because of no surrogacy laws, there's no way to get full legal rights of the child once it's born which is why people aren't doing it," she said.

Ms Vanderham said she "understands the (rules) with surrogacy and adoption are strict for a very good reason".

"We were happy to have police checks, financial reports, psychologist reports, family tree, medical history for both us and our families and counselling sessions," she said.

"If a couple has a willing surrogate, and are prepared to pay for the surrogate's medical bills, they have been through all the necessary checks, medicals and counselling and are

still willing to go ahead, should it matter whether they are legally deemed infertile?"

"If having seven failed IVF attempts over eight years of trying, not to mention trying naturally isn't enough to prove there are fertility issues then something needs to change.

"I'm not saying that we should use surrogacy as a standard practice, but for those people out there who are so deserving and have faced obstacle after obstacle, why make it so hard?"

Ms Vanderham said the couple did not meet the criteria for adoption waiting lists in many countries because they were simultaneously trying to

have a biological child and did not practice religion.

She said the couple's case worker contacted them in December last year to say their application to adopt a child from Thailand had been accepted but that there would be a "three-year wait".

"I got goosebumps all over and burst into tears. It was almost like I just knew, this was our child. It just felt right," Ms Vanderham said.

"We had already waited seven years.

"What was another three?"

Soon after, Ms Vanderham found out she was pregnant, and the couple is expecting a child in October.

Mum fears losing her baby to crackdown in Thailand

AN AUSTRALIAN woman is terrified that she will lose her unborn baby after the Thai surrogacy clinic she is using was raided in the wake of the continuing baby Gammy saga.

The South Australian mother, who will be identified only as "Sarah", is getting ready to leave for Thailand in eight weeks for the birth of her second child via a surrogate.

But the mother holds grave

fears for her unborn baby - due in 10 weeks - and the wellbeing of her surrogate as an industry crackdown in the wake of Gammy's case now means retrieving the child could become a legal minefield.

Since Gammy's story went public - sparking fierce debate on the moral and legal grounding of international surrogacy - Thailand's strict military rulers have introduced new sanc-

tions on the country's booming baby market and have already raided the clinic that is facilitating Sarah's surrogacy.

While the clinic's nurses have reassured Sarah that all of their surrogates are being looked after, she has also been warned new arrangements could be needed to bring her baby into the world, including a last-minute change of hospital and doctor.

"My big concern is that my surrogate is okay," she said.

"This (stressful situation in Thailand) puts irrational thoughts in your head."

Sarah used the same clinic - which is not where Gammy's Thai surrogate had IVF treatment - to have her daughter 19 months ago and described it as an "amazing" experience.

But the unpredictable situation in Thailand has her pre-

paring for the worst, including the prospect of a lengthy legal battle with the Thai courts to get custody of her baby.

"My biggest fear is that they take my baby," she said. "I'm not leaving the country until I can legally leave with my baby."

Sarah battled for 10 years to conceive a child, including unsuccessful attempts at IVF, and said she turned to surrogacy in Thailand as a last resort.

Wait is over as Festival kicks off

LOVERS of entertainment, be warned – sleep will be for the weak once the 2014 Darwin Festival kicks off tonight.

Across 18 days there will be 80 events at 37 locations, including the Urab and Zogo Tudi dancers who put on a small show before the opening.

Darwin Festival artistic director Edwina Lunn said residents and visitors would not want to miss any of it.

"The wait is over ... I am sure that people will not be sleeping for these 18 days," she said.

"This weekend is the biggest, with 100% Darwin, a show that's been done in Tokyo Vienna, Athens ... an opportunity to put locals on stage where they'll share their stories."

International events in the Darwin Festival program have an Asian flavour as the NT looks to strengthen cultural ties with the region.

Chief Minister Adam Giles said the festival was an example of all that is Darwin.

"The NT Government has put \$1.3 million into it, with \$296,000 in funding through the FestivalsNT initiative," he said.

Other major events include tonight's free opening night concert featuring Tina Arena, comedian Frank Woodley's latest show and theatre production *The Shadow King* featuring Tom E. Lewis.

Ms Lunn is in the last year of her role and, while feeling nostalgic, said Darwin Festival will continue to prosper because of audience support.

"The festival's in a fantastic position, and it's special because of the landscape, people and climate," she said.

"We're proud that we can program content that's challenging, risky work ... if that makes a few people cranky, at least they're feeling something and I've done my job."

Ticket sales are at 50 per cent of the target, but remain on sale throughout the event, so are expected to reach the mark.

Nitschke wants his appeal in NT

DEBATE on where the appeal to euthanasia advocate Philip Nitschke's suspension by the Medical Board of Australia (MBA) should be held was heard at a directions hearing in Darwin yesterday.

Although registered as a doctor in the NT for 25 years, Dr Nitschke was in South Australia when he emailed 45-year-old Perth man Nigel Brayley to support his decision to take his own life.

The ABC reported Dr Nitschke immediately vowed to appeal against the MBA's decision to consider a ruling in South Australia.

A date for the next hearing has not been set, but his lawyers have until August 15 to respond to the MBA's argument.

Fine mess as mother picks up son's \$13k tab

SOME men only a mother could love.

A serial fine-dodger from Moil, for example, was sent to jail last week after refusing to take part in community service to work off his \$13,569 debt.

Yesterday, after six days in the company of murderers and rapists at Berrimah jail, his Mum paid off the tab.

The man, 23, walked free yesterday afternoon. It is believed he was the first person to

be sent to prison in the Northern Territory under new hard-line measures that are designed to crack down on fine dodgers and recover more than \$40 million owed to the public purse.

People who refuse to pay fines can be placed on community work orders, where they effectively work off the outstanding bill.

In this case, the NT Fines Recovery Unit had attempted several times to get the 23-year-old to put his hand in his pocket to pay the fines, which were mostly for traffic offences including driving unlicensed and speeding.

Payment plans were en-

tered into – on several occasions beginning in 2009 – but never followed through.

Eventually the man, who is in full-time employment, was served a community work order. He refused and was

served with a "notice of correction" last Thursday, before being processed into Berrimah prison on Friday.

Under the NT Government's crackdown, every day spent in jail equates to \$288 worth of fines revenue.

The man's mother could have left the man in jail until September 15, when the debt would have been considered repaid, and saved \$11,781.

When he announced the fines crackdown in May, Attorney-General John Elferink warned there would be consequences if people did not pay fines.

"Deterrents must be put in place for serial offenders and it

is time for them to realise that there will be consequences for them failing to pay their fines," he said.

"The measures are aimed at those who blatantly disregard their obligation to pay, despite being more than capable to do so."

The NT News reported in May that a high-ranking NT Government bureaucrat had been ordered to complete community service to work off 109 unpaid fines.

The public servant earns more than \$120,000 a year.

But they had refused to pay \$14,435 in speeding, traffic and parking fines, which dated back to 2009.

Trapped commuter finds people power really rocks

HUNDREDS of passengers rocked a train carriage back and forth to free a man whose leg was caught in the gap between the train and a Perth station platform yesterday.

Authorities praising their efforts as an example of "people power".

The man was boarding the city-bound train at Stirling when he stepped awkwardly and slipped in to the gap.

A Transperth spokeswoman said passengers were

asked to stand on the other side of the carriage to shift its position but it was not enough to free the man's leg from the 10cm gap between carriage and platform.

"When that didn't work they got people off and gathered together enough of them to line up, and say 'one, two, three, push'," she said.

Witness Nicolas Taylor said the man seemed fine but was a little embarrassed.

"He seemed to be a bit

sheepish because right where he fell was the 'mind the gap' writing," he said.

A passenger, identified only as Nic, said the man was lifted to safety by two other passengers when the gap widened.

Paramedics treated the man but he was not badly injured and caught a later train.

Nic said the incident made him rethink the warning signs to "mind the gap".

"It's not something you take seriously. I always thought it

was a bit of a joke but now, yeah, you kind of do," he said.

"It is the first time we've seen something like this happen," the Transperth spokeswoman Claire Krol said. "We were really fortunate that the staff were there straight away ... and all of the passengers not only listened to the instructions, but pitched in and helped."

"This is a real case of passengers working together ... and people power are the perfect words to describe it."

Danger on the dancefloor

A YOUNG man was kicked out of a Darwin nightclub for “reckless dancing” and punched a police van before he tried to fight another prisoner – in a stoush over snoring – at the watch house.

Levis Mulume Nawej, 20, was angry when security guards ejected him from Monsoons, on Mitchell St, using the “stupid excuse” about his dance moves, Darwin Magistrates Court has been told.

Defence lawyer Caroline Snell said her client “acted like a total goose in the cells” after he punched a dent in the police van bonnet and screamed at the cops “out of frustration”.

Nawej, whose partner is expecting their first child, admitted charges of property damage and disorderly behaviour in a police station when he faced court yesterday.

Prosecutor Dodie Roden said Monsoons management had previously banned Nawej from the club.

He told the cops outside that he was angry at being kicked out for “reckless dancing” early on March 16.

He belted the van’s bonnet, causing \$570 damage, in Shadforth Lane, and was taken into protective custody in a shared cell at the watch house.

“He got angry because

other prisoners were snoring,” Ms Roden said.

“He was screaming and throwing blankets at them, and had to be moved after he shaped up to fight another prisoner.”

Ms Roden said Nawej didn’t shut up in the single cell but continued to yell at station staff on the intercom.

He threw wads of wet toilet paper at the security camera, obstructed officers who tried to clean up the mess and had to be restrained, before charging at the door and kicking the cell walls and windows.

He eventually fell asleep.

Nawej told police he was raging because: “The snoring was loud.”

Magistrate Michael Carey said: “It’s not the first time you’ve had difficulty with police – get your act together.”

Nawej was ordered to do 20 hours community work and fined \$550.

Police catch last escapee at Nakara

THE final escapee from Darwin’s youth prison has been caught in a Darwin suburb.

Josiah Binsaris, 15, was spotted by police in Nakara about 11am yesterday.

He was taken into custody immediately.

He was one of five youths who escaped from Don Dale Detention Centre on Saturday.

The others have been gradually taken into custody

since. The group allegedly threatened security staff with gym equipment.

A Corrections investigation has been launched.

NT Police advised the public to be “vigilant around the security of their homes and motor vehicles” when the boys were on the loose.

It is understood the group was in the detention centre mostly for property theft.

Power grid upgrade making strides

THE first of three new circuit breakers at the Hudson Creek Switchyard is now up and running, according to Power and Water Corp.

The Territory Government had warned the upgrades, expected to be completed by the end of the month, could mean blackouts for some users.

Replacing the 132kV circuit breakers has been challenging and creates an element of risk

to the system, Power and Water said.

With the first breaker now a functioning part of the switchyard, the second breaker was due to be installed yesterday and the third later this month.

The work is part of \$800,000 in upgrades to the substation this year. The Government said it is planning another \$3.5 million upgrade next dry season.

Bottled-up anger over broken glass

THE Katherine Town Council has demanded the Northern Territory Government take action over an increasing smashed glass problem.

The council wrote to the Minister for Alcohol Policy David Tollner last week demanding action, after residents and council were fed up with the sea of broken glass bottles littering the town and creating both an eyesore and a safety

issue, the *Katherine Times* reported. “I’m sick of it and so are our residents,” Mayor Fay Miller said.

The council has invested \$8000 to buy two specialised, pedestrian, vacuum sweepers to combat the problem.

Ms Miller labelled the Government “negligent”, and said it left “all decisions about alcohol issues to each region separately”.

Arrested woman hit out at cops after crash

A DRUNK woman violently resisted arrest after she crashed her car into a power pole, accidentally smacked her own face into a fence and tried to blame it on police, a court has heard.

Personal trainer Ashlie Patricia Fahy, 30, escaped having a conviction recorded against her name – because it would impact her travel to the US for bodybuilding competitions – when she faced court.

Darwin Magistrate Michael Carey said Fahy's behaviour was appalling.

"You were out of control – police have a difficult job without people acting the way you did," he said.

Defence lawyer Catherine Voumard said her client suffered a broken rib, cuts and bruises, and was "ashamed".

Fahy had been drinking at home before she crashed her Suzuki Swift into a power pole on Rothdale Rd, at Jingili, late on July 15.

A witness called an ambulance and a passing police patrol stopped at the scene.

Fahy became aggressive and refused to be taken to Royal Darwin Hospital.

She told police to "f--- off", wrenching away her arms when they tried to cuff her and clung to a fence.

Prosecutor Dodie Roden said cops tried to pull Fahy's arms behind her back when her face "collided with the fence". "She screamed that police had broken her nose," Ms Roden said.

"They were still trying to handcuff her when she walked her legs up the fence and started pushing back."

Fahy was taken to hospital where she refused to let a doctor take observations or a blood sample.

Police took her to the watch house where she blew .120 when she was declared fit for custody.

Ms Voumard said the mother-of-one had "recent bad experiences" at RDH and now lived in Perth.

Fahy was fined a total of \$1550 and banned from the road for six months.

Talk about messing with wrong crowd

Tourist Greg Patterson was

in town for the Darwin Cup with his 10 police friends when one of their backpacks went missing as they were swimming at the lagoon at lunchtime on Saturday.

They had noticed a man sitting on a bench near their gear.

"One of the guys came out of the water and said: 'Where's my bag?', and everyone realised he'd taken it," Mr Patterson

said. "From a non-member perspective, their whole demeanour changed. The hunt was on.

"They worked together, there was guys going in different directions.

"Everyone split up and had a role to play."

While Mr Patterson was getting the car, the other officers had spotted the alleged of-

fender in Cotton On on Smith St Mall.

"I dropped two guys at the end of the mall and they surveilled him and made a citizen's arrest," he said.

The NT Police arrived and finished off the job. The bag contained a wallet, a phone, and other personal items.

"They helped the local blokes fill the report and made

their own statements," he said. "They were 100 per cent in police mode."

He said they still enjoyed the holiday.

"It was a good talking point," he said.

The alleged offender, a 40-year-old man, was taken into custody and was charged with three counts of theft and one count of trespass.

Breakdown ends in gun charges

A MAN with three unlicensed guns and a knife threatened to kill himself after a party when he had a mental breakdown.

Carpenter Bernhardt Duncan had a six-shot pistol revolver, a pump action shotgun and a magnum when he had a breakdown at a social function at his home in Noonamah on May 16.

He appeared in Darwin Magistrates Court on 24 firearms charges on Tuesday.

The court heard he had consumed an amount of al-

cohol and was threatening to kill himself with the firearms and the knife.

"He has been through some personal hardships, that was the reason for police attending his property," the court heard.

"The two pistols came into his ownership on a building site some years ago.

"They remained unlicensed. The shotgun wasn't licenced.

"That particular weapon was his grandfather's and it was an old weapon and meant a lot to him."

The Police Commissioner has since disposed of the guns.

The court heard that the 39-year-old had been a "largely responsible firearm owner" and the weapons were normally kept in secure storage.

Duncan was a hardworking carpenter employing up to five people, who had a close relationship with his two daughters, and that he was trying to get his life back on track.

The court heard he co-oper-

ated with police. He apologised to the court and to the police for the incident.

Magistrate Michael Carey said Mr Duncan would lose the right to hold a firearms licence for two years. "It's a shame to see you before the court with this matter," he said.

Magistrate Carey, recorded a conviction, aggregated the charges and fined Mr Duncan \$400 plus four victims' levies.

Police found 6000 rounds of ammunition at the house.

Police keep mum after 10th officer suspended

THE 10th Northern Territory police officer this year has been suspended, after he was charged with driving under the influence and leaving the scene of an accident.

But police have refused to say:

WHEN the accident occurred.

WHEN the officer was charged, and

IF he was suspended with or without pay.

The 33-year-old was stood down from duty and has been summonsed to appear in the

Katherine Magistrates Court on September 8.

Police generally refuse to give further details when officers get on the wrong side of the law.

"This information is provided in accordance with the NT Police transparency guidelines," a statement said.

He was the 10th officer suspended this year, compared to six at the same time in 2013.

Two police officers in Alice Springs were also suspended to face court after a similar incident in May.

Divers say pay is a croc

Inpex workers arc up over saltie dangers

DIVERS working on the Inpex project are in a dispute with their employers over pay and shift times.

Employees of Seaforce Marine Diving Service, who are working on the \$34 billion Inpex Ichthys project, are in

negotiations today through the Maritime Union of Australia (MUA).

One worker, who wished to remain anonymous, said the divers were being paid \$300 less a day than they should be.

"We get into the water with crocs every day and we get paid less than the cleaners are getting paid (on the Inpex pro-

ject)," he said. "One guy even got sacked for speaking up, the morale is terrible."

MUA NT branch secretary Thomas Mayor said there were several issues that had to be discussed with Seaforce, who contract to JKC Australia.

"Diving is a dangerous occupation, there is lot of risk involved, especially in our

waters, they would have to be the lowest-paid workers on the Inpex project regardless of their skill level," he said. "There are also safety issues."

Among the problems put forward by the MUA are that the workers are required by Seaforce to operate the *Kathmandu* vessel while also diving, superannuation has not been

paid to some employees and rates are not up to standard.

JKC Australia did not respond to an inquiry by the *NT News* when contacted yesterday.

This is not the first time Seaforce Marine Diving Service has been in hot water.

In June, the *NT News* revealed that the company had

attempted to alter its crocodile management plan and make divers keep working around crocodiles.

Leaked documents showed a plan that said if a saltie was smaller than 1.5m then employees should "continue diving as normal" and if a croc was 300m or more away to ignore it regardless of size.

But this was rejected by JKC Australia when the company became aware of the proposed changes.

Mother of all work worries

DISCRIMINATION against pregnant women and parents in the workplace is a pervasive problem that has detrimental impacts on Australians and the economy, a new report by the Australian Human Rights Commission says.

Sex Discrimination Commissioner Elizabeth Broderick was in Darwin yesterday to present findings from the Supporting Working Parents: Pregnancy and Return to Work National Review.

"Not only does discrimination exist and is pervasive, but it's experienced by one in two working mothers," Ms Broderick said.

That discrimination comes in all forms, she added, from unfavourable treatment by employers, to demeaning attitudes from co-workers and missing out on job opportunities.

"At the really serious end, it's being asked to have your job terminated. It's basically your choice: the job or the baby," she said.

The national review included consultations with individuals and interest groups, including 2000 working mothers, community organisations and industry peak bodies. For the first time, the commission also looked at fathers and partners who took short leave

under the Government's Dad and Partner Pay scheme.

The report found that both sexes experience some form of workplace discrimination, most of which may come from the inherent attitude that the best workers are those that do not have carer responsibilities, Ms Broderick said.

"I think the majority of the solution comes from a change in attitude," she said.

"We need to change what they call 'the good mother belief'. Changing that so we believe as a nation that caring is everyone's business. We believe that only women make good carers and that's just not true."

The report also recommends workers and employers better understand their rights and obligations surrounding maternity and parental leave.

The commission has called on the Government to make clear guidelines available for everyone as well as to address gaps in the protection of rights.

The commission heard from NT working mums and employers who said local issues included difficulty filling maternity leave positions because of a shallow labour market.

Other local issues involved women with complicated pregnancies needing to miss more time from work than the national average to keep appointments with specialists.

Smarties in food sector set own healthy list

KIT Kat chocolate bars, Cocoa Pops and Smarties are considered "healthy" foods that can be marketed to children under a controversial food industry advertising code.

The Cancer Council NSW is demanding the Federal Government regulate junk food advertising after a study found 40 per cent of the food deemed healthy by food companies did

not meet the Government's own regulations on whether a food could be called healthy.

Food Standards Australia New Zealand has developed nutrition criteria to prevent companies making claims such as "low fat and good for your heart" if the product contains lots of sugar and salt.

Instead of using this criteria to define healthy food, the food

industry has set up its own voluntary advertising code called the Responsible Children's Marketing Initiative.

Under this code each food company sets its own definition of what is a healthy food and can therefore be advertised to children. The 17 large food companies who are signatories to the code have 14 different definitions of healthy.

World loves taste of 'Great Aussie Bite'



NEARLY 300,000 people - more than the population of the Northern Territory - saw yesterday's classic NT News front page of Brutus the croc taking a chunk out of a bull shark.

The stunning "Great Australian Bite" photos were picked up by media outlets around the world.

On Facebook, the image of our front page had been seen

by 274,000 people by 5pm yesterday. It was retweeted hundreds of times on Twitter, including by former NSW Premier Barry O'Farrell. ABC managing director Mark Scott tweeted our street poster.

The incident, involving legendary 5.5m, three-legged saltie Brutus, stunned onlookers. Adelaide River cruise operator Morgan Bowman said it

was the first time he'd ever seen a croc catch a shark.

The photos were captured by Sydneysider Andrew Paice, who is travelling around Australia with his young family.

It was not the first time Brutus has made worldwide headlines. In 2011 a photo of him jumping from the river was so spectacular we had to assure people it was real.

Sources make a call: 9/9 for iPhone 6 show

AFTER months of rumours and leaks about Apple's iPhone 6, now we have a date of its launch: September 9.

Or, at least, we have multiple reports from sources citing those in the know that come September 9, Apple's CEO Tim Cook will stand in front of iPhone fans and reveal Apple's version, or versions, of a smartphone phablet.

Recode reported that Apple will be holding an event on September 9 to launch the iPhone 6, which will come in two screen sizes, a 4.7- and 5.5-inch, both of which is a step up from Apple's current 4-inch iPhone 5S.

The Wall Street Journal has also reported the September 9 event for the iPhone launch, citing "a person familiar with

the matter". The date has not been confirmed by Apple, nor would you expect it to given the company's approach to let rumours fuel the fire for new products. If the date is true, the timing could be a deliberate move by Apple to overshadow IFA Berlin 2014, the consumer electronics show where many technology companies choose to launch new products.

BATCHELOR Institute of Indigenous Tertiary Education will celebrate 40 years of research, education and training with a two-day conference at its Batchelor campus.

The "Finding the Common Ground with Indigenous and Western Knowledge Systems" sessions will include addresses from academics and senior staff on a range of ideas around indigenous research.

Aboriginal lecturer in VET Education Support, Evelyn Schaber, will be a keynote speaker and said it was part of her commitment to her people.

"The aspirations of Aboriginal and Torres Strait people can only be achieved through education," she said. "Batchelor Institute has proved a very valuable vehicle for our people all over Australia in achieving their aspirations."

The celebrations will include arts, history, food and cultural programs.

Wine and women a bad combo

TWO women and the urge to join in birthday celebrations has landed one man in a pickle.

Curtis Dingle, 26, of Ngukurr, admitted three breaches of his Alcohol Protection Order in the past 10 days.

He told police he got on the grog for his ex-wife's birthday when he was arrested, after he passed out on site at Nungalinya College on July 29.

He blew .210.

Police gave him bail but he was arrested the next day when police spotted him with wine in a plastic bottle.

Dingle was bailed again – only to be remanded after transit security officers kicked him off a bus at Winnellie Post Office, due to his drunken behaviour, on Tuesday.

He told police he got drunk because it was his girlfriend's birthday. Magistrate Michael Carey sentenced Dingle to two days in prison, backdated to his arrest, and told him to get on the bus back to Ngukurr today.

Sailor's death rewrites history of World War I

AUSTRALIA'S Great War history is set to be rewritten to identify a Townsville sailor as the first man to die in an Australian uniform in World War I.

Able Seaman John Courtney, 29, fell during the little-known first Australian battle of the war and the first amphibious assault on September 11, 1914 at the village of Bita Paka on the island of New Britain.

Courtney, whose birth name was John Edward Walker, was a navy reservist at-

tached to the Australian Naval and Military Expeditionary Force. His service number was 45.

Most official websites barely even mention Courtney and none has an image of the sailor which is published for the first time by News Corp Australia.

The image was uncovered by the museum at HMAS Cerberus in Victoria.

His force, which included several warships and about 500 men, was ordered to capture the German wireless station at Bita Paka in what was then German New Guinea.

The station was defended by eight German troops and 60 Melanesians.

Six men from the Australian side were killed during the battle including medical officer Captain Brian Pockley from Sydney and Able Seaman Billy Williams of Melbourne who have long been regarded as the first Australian casualties of the war.

However after being mortally wounded early on during the action they were transferred to the troop ship HMAS *Berrima* where they died later in the day.

Historians, including Michael Kelly from the Australian War Memorial, believe that Courtney died before the two men on the ship.

But the nephew of Billy Williams, Ron Mullinger of Melbourne, doubted that 100 years of history was incorrect.

"The navy records show that Billy Williams was shot first and taken to the *Berrima*," he said. "It seems funny that the records should be changed on the 100th anniversary of the battle."

He was attached to a reinforcing force under the com-

mand of Royal Navy officer Commander Charles Elwell and he was shot and killed instantly by a sniper around midday on September 11. Elwell, a British citizen, was killed soon afterwards and the men were buried together near where they fell.

According to Melbourne historian David Howell, who traced some of the rare photos of the six men killed and the official documents showing Courtney died first, the facts have not been hidden but the record had simply never been corrected.

New hub will bowl city over

A NEW entertainment hub for children is set to open at Darwin Airport by February, with the city's second bowling alley among the drawcards.

It is part of the airport's ongoing expansion and the first flagship centre for specialist operator Ardent Leisure, building on its AMF Bowling and Kingpin brands.

The announcement of a bowling alley has sparked concern about Darwin's tenpin competition, but the association's NT president Janine Matheson said that the future was unclear.

"The announcement is a shock," she said.

"We had heard it was more than just a rumour another alley would open, but then the idea was shelved.

"We don't know how this will affect Planet Tenpin or our competition just yet.

"We'll have to sit down and look at the situation."

Darwin Airport said in a statement the centre will offer something for children, families and the corporate market.

The bowling alley will have 22 lanes, and sit alongside a 900sq m laser skirmish area, and a rope-climbing course.

The centre will also offer casual dining and bar facilities.

NT Airports Director Property Ross Baynes said Ardent's Family Entertainment Centre was a unique addition and would strengthen the airport's property portfolio.

"Our approach to development on the airport aims to create diverse, long-term business opportunities within our community," he said.

"AMF Bowling and Kingpin are successful, proven businesses, and the prospect of a new concept designed for Darwin is an exciting one – one that will create jobs and offer a range of activities."

Planet Tenpin at Nightcliff has been Darwin's only bowling alley before now.

Dismay over Tracy events

SURVIVORS of Cyclone Tracy say they are not happy about Darwin council's commemoration plans.

The council has announced an all-faith church service, a social gathering, a star for the mall Christmas tree, tree-light dimming ceremony and a new plaque as part of the 40th anniversary of the tragedy.

But those who lived through the cyclone said the events could be better.

Jill McKerchar-Kinang, who lives in WA and administers the Cyclone Tracy 40th Anniversary Commemoration and Memories Facebook group, said the proposed plaque needs to be more visible.

"Many of us want it on the Esplanade, a non-denomi-

national space," she said. "To hear they are putting it (at Christ Church Cathedral) is a bit of a disappointment."

Ms McKerchar-Kinang said she had just finished Year 12 when Tracy struck.

"Cyclone Tracy is of major significance, it's part of our history. People like me are getting older, we don't want this to fade away."

Fellow survivor Sean Kennedy said the commemorations were being "dictated by bureaucrats".

"We want something that tells our story, survivors are being ignored once again, that's why this will not meet anyone's expectations."

Mr Kennedy echoed Ms McKerchar-Kinang's desire to have the plaque on the Esplanade.

But he wanted more, such as a statue.

"This is another dull uninspiring plaque."

Darwin council acting general manager community and cultural services Anna Malgorzewicz said the plaque would be in the cathedral portico. "The portico is part of a central Darwin heritage precinct area, and the public space will provide a place to leave tributes."

A cost breakdown of the events could not be provided.

"The \$100,000 in this year's budget was put in place at the early stages of building the community-led program for the Commemoration of the 40th Anniversary of Cyclone Tracy," Ms Malgorzewicz said. "The program events announced do not require the full \$100,000 budget."



EDITORIAL NT News Time to legalise surrogacy in NT

THE NORTHERN Territory doesn't have any laws governing surrogacy but like many Australians, those unable to conceive are still being forced overseas in search of surrogate mothers, in a desperate bid to become parents.

Most of them have already endured countless failed attempts at IVF after being unable to conceive naturally.

Others have invested years on international adoption waiting lists with nothing to show for it except shattered dreams, broken hearts and empty wallets.

And some, like hard-working Nhulunbuy couple Brendan and Shany Vanderham, have tried it all.

Fortunately for this couple, Ms Vanderham fell pregnant - after eight years of trying everything they could to become parents, at the cost of more than \$150,000 - earlier this year.

While the pair are elated with their baby news and remain on an adoption waiting list in the hope of adopting another child, they say it shouldn't be this hard or take this long for loving people who want to become parents, to do so.

And they're right.

Of course there should always be strict rules and regulations in place when it comes to the welfare of children, particularly through international adoption.

But when you have a couple, like the Vanderhams, who have passed all of the psychological and financial tests associated with becoming adoptive parents, with a relative who volunteers to be a surrogate for their child, why shouldn't it be allowed to happen?

Not only would the introduction of laws to allow surrogacy in the NT open the doors for more Territorians to achieve their dreams of being parents, but it would also stop them from risking and losing everything in search of a child abroad.

...and another thing

DIMMING a few Christmas lights and putting up a plaque is not, frankly, the sort of Cyclone Tracy commemoration we expected.

We do a lot to look back at the bombing of Darwin, and quite rightly so.

But Tracy was just as significant in shaping the modern city and its resilient people.

The 40th anniversary of our worst cyclone deserves something more significant than what Darwin City Council has planned.

Shorter leash

A CALL in the NT News to have certain dog breeds banned because of attacks has brought forth the argument it is the owner, not the dog.

It doesn't say how such unbalanced owners may be identified. We must wait until a mauling or killing to find out.

Dog attacks in Australia since 2000 have resulted in 25 deaths, according to media reports.

Most owners are blissfully unaware of such killers until a mauling or fatality occurs. Then they say: "He was a gentle family dog" or "He loved children".

In Victoria, owners can be jailed for 10 years if their dog kills someone or five years if it endangers a person's life.

Restricted breeds in Victoria must now be registered. Prosecution is possible if a dog attacks someone in the owner's home.

Victoria maintains dog attack statistics and in the 11 years to July 2013, 5677 dog bite victims were admitted to hospital while 18,236 others sought emergency treatment.

Royalty decree

IT HAS recently been revealed that \$407 million of royalty money received by the NT Government from mining companies in the past six years has been gifted back to the mining industry in subsidies.

It is estimated 80 per cent of the revenue anticipated to be collected from miners in the NT this year will also be given back to the mining companies.

It is understandable politicians of all political convictions are reluctant to talk about this.

While all the states subsidise miners, on a per capita basis the NT is by far the most generous. It provides in excess of \$1600 per head, per annum compared to \$180 in SA and \$35 per head in Victoria.

Approximately 50 per cent of land in the Territory is under Native Title, with mining royalties going to four land councils.

It would be interesting to see how much revenue the land councils hand to the miners. I doubt they would be as generous, or as foolish, as the NT Government in handing over the bulk of royalties.

Supporters of fracking speak about the economic benefits the NT will derive from it. Some are naive enough to believe fracking royalties will lower spiralling power prices.

Many citizens are unaware most royalty money is given back to the largely overseas-controlled mining companies.

STUDENTS at Lajamanu School, about 890km south of Darwin, have played host to a group from Bendigo TAFE in Victoria.

The Bendigo group of 14 students aged 17 and 18, studying conservational land management, engineering or building and construction, visited for a week thanks to their own fundraising efforts and helped with community and school-based projects.

Lajamanu School assistant principal Elizabeth Milne said it was a two-way sharing exercise where students interacted with others they would not normally meet.

"The students from Bendigo have seen what a remote community is like, while our students have talked with kids from somewhere they have never been," she said.

Lajamanu School trade trainer Owen Coco organised work projects to be done ahead of the visitors' arrival, setting tasks to be completed for the school and the community.

Bin stands were constructed to be placed in the town streets, while paving and fencing were

placed around the playgroup area at the school.

"The Lajamanu guys (aged 13 and 14) have been going through OHS (occupational health and safety) and workplace safety," he said.

"It's been a great exchange where they have had the opportunity to apply the skills they have learnt."

Mr Coco's Bendigo counterpart Kevin Harrison said the exchange was good for his TAFE students.

"They do this whole trip as part of their personal development," he said.

Neal Gunn, 18, said the trip to Lajamanu School had opened his eyes to a different avenue for future work.

"I would love to come back to a community ... even being a groundskeeper here would be worthwhile," he said.

The visit is part of an ongoing relationship between the two institutions, having now run for four years.

Resignation after abusive language

SYDNEY: Mike Carlton has resigned as a columnist for Fairfax over his use of offensive language towards readers complaining about his recent column about the war in Gaza.

Fairfax's Head of Business Media Sean Alymer confirmed Mr Carlton's resignation to 2UE yesterday morning, saying there was no problem with his editorial column from July 26 on the Israel-Hamas conflict.

Mr Alymer said the problem was the way Mr Carlton treated readers with "very inappropriate language" after they contacted him with issues about both the column and accompanying cartoon.

\$50m deal as hunt for plane goes on

CANBERRA: Australia has signed a contract worth more than \$50 million to scour the ocean floor for the wreckage of missing Malaysia Airlines flight MH370.

Almost five months after the passenger jet carrying 239 people went missing, the search continues in the southern Indian Ocean off the West Australian coast, where officials are confident the aircraft lies.

Dutch company Fugro will begin sonar scanning in September. It will analyse the 60,000sq km seabed. Almost half has been mapped, finding depths ranging from 4.8km-1.5km and underwater volcanoes.

Web of meta confusion has PM in tangle

CANBERRA: The Federal Government will not require internet companies to store people's web-browsing history as part of its new counterterrorism plans, despite the Prime Minister suggesting it would.

Tony Abbott created confusion around the suite of measures yesterday when he tried to explain what types of customer metadata telecommunications companies would be required to keep for two years.

While it's expected the information about Australians' calls, texts and emails will be included, Mr Abbott suggested web-browser history could also be captured.

"It's not what you're doing on the internet, it's the sites you're visiting," he told the Nine Network yesterday morning. "It's not the content, it's just where you've been, so to speak." But the Prime Min-

ister's office later clarified his statement, saying browser history was not metadata and government agencies would still need a warrant to access such information.

In relation to mobile phones, metadata includes information such as origin and destination phone numbers, the billing name and address of both parties, time and duration of the correspondence, and the telecommunications tower used. It does not include the content of the correspondence.

Online metadata covers the user-specific internet identifier

code, IP addresses visited and the time, duration and number of visits. It does not include the content of web browsing.

Mr Abbott said telecommunications companies already kept such information, and the Government was simply asking them to continue to do so.

"I have no doubt the civil libertarian brigade will do their best to stop this but my responsibility as Prime Minister is to keep our country safe," he said.

"All of the expert advice from every single counterterrorist agency is that this information is absolutely essential if we are to maintain our vigilance against terrorist activity."

Opposition Leader Bill Shorten said Labor respected the fact national security laws needed updating.

"But ... this needs to be done very carefully ... so there is no risk ordinary Australians are treated as if they are criminals."

Pit bull kills babysitter

BOISE: A woman babysitting her two-year-old grandson was mauled to death by his mum's pet dog, identified by the owner as a pit bull.

Cindy Whisman, 59, had gone into the backyard of her daughter Julie's home with the toddler in Madison Township, Ohio, when the red-and-white coloured dog turned on her, knocked her down and pinned her to the ground.

A neighbour, 79-year-old Wayne Walker, heard Whisman's cries and managed to beat the dog away with a walking stick, WCPO reported.

"It looked like it (the dog) took a chunk of her throat out around the jugular," Walker said, the *Dayton Daily* newspaper reported.

"Whenever I hit him he yelped and took off running straight into their house. I looked at (Cindy Whisman) ... she's gone."

High alert as scribbled note sparks bomb threat drama

SHADOWED by an RAF Typhoon jet bristling with weaponry, this is the moment fear was brought to Britain's skies when an airline passenger claimed there was a bomb on the plane.

After the Airbus pilot notified air traffic control of the threat, the fighter – part of the RAF's Quick Reaction Alert force – was scrambled to tail the flight as it made its approach to Manchester.

The airport was shut down and other incoming flights diverted as the police and military initiated full-scale

emergency plans that could lead to the shooting down of an airliner that posed a terrorist threat. Officially the Minis-

try of Defence refuses to discuss the actions open to fighter pilots or who would give the orders, saying it is

classified information. Dramatic photos showed the Typhoon jet accompanying the Qatar Airways flight – carrying 269 passengers, including several Australians, and 13 crew – as it made its descent.

After it landed and taxied to a remote part of the runway police boarded to arrest a 47-year-old man.

They were soon able to confirm that the threat was a hoax.

The incident happened just before 1pm yesterday as the flight from Doha came in to land.

Sources said cabin crew on the flight were passed a scribbled note by a passenger who appeared sober and coherent.

It read: "There is a bomb on board this plane."

The source said: "It quickly became clear we were not dealing with an international terrorist here but a prize idiot. It appears he scribbled the note out of boredom and handed it to cabin crew as they came round collecting rubbish."

The suspected hoaxer, wearing a green T-shirt, was taken away in handcuffs. Chief Superintendent John O'Hare of Greater Manchester Police said: "A 47-year-old man from the North West has been arrested on suspicion of making a bomb hoax and remains in police custody for questioning."

Hackers hit passwords

NEW YORK: About 1.6 billion internet username and password combinations have been stolen by a Russian crime gang in a huge security breach.

US security firm Hold Security revealed material had been gathered from more than 500 million email addresses and 420,000 websites.

The hackers targeted both big and small websites.

Hold Security has not named the companies which have been targeted.

However another security expert who analysed the stolen credentials said the breach was authentic. It is understood some larger companies are aware their records were among the stolen information.

Female fans stripsearched

MOSCOW: The Russian Premier League condemned the treatment of female soccer fans who say they were strip-searched by male police officers before a match in the World Cup 2018 host city of Kazan.

Several Spartak Moscow fans said police refused to allow female fans into the stadium unless they complied.

Fan Ekaterina Stepanova wrote of the "humiliation" in which female fans were singled out and "required to strip, and that includes being demanded to remove their underwear" for a search lasting up to 10 minutes.

Double the chaos as buses collide in Times Square

NEW YORK: A traffic accident involving two double-decker tour buses in the city's Times Square Theatre District on Tuesday afternoon (local time) sent shattered glass flying and injured 14 people, three of them seriously.

None of the injuries was believed to be life-threatening,

the Fire Department of New York said.

Tourist Cara McCaskill, of Winnipeg, Canada, saw the scene of the accident moments after it happened as she walked out of her hotel.

"I saw fire trucks trying to get through all the crazy traffic," the 16-year-old said. "And

I saw ambulances and blood on the ground."

The accident occurred around 47th St and Seventh Ave in Manhattan, an area of Times Square usually teeming with tourists near a TKTS discount Broadway tickets booth and the Hershey's Chocolate World store. It shut down a

stretch of Seventh Ave. At least eight people, including several bus passengers, were treated at the scene, city officials said.

One of the buses crashed into a light pole, causing it to topple, witnesses said.

The glass in the front of the bus was shattered, and glass was strewn on the pavement.

Bystanders said the scene was initially chaotic, with people running around trying to help.

Rose Cantillon was visiting the city from Ireland and was nearby.

"I was sitting on a bench, and I turned around and heard screaming, and I ran," she said.

Second boy claims teacher sex

SALT LAKE CITY: A former Utah high school English teacher facing rape charges has been accused of having sex with a second boy.

Brianne Altice, 35, was set to stand trial for the rape and sodomy of a 16-year-old student but new claims reveal a second student, 17, has also reported having sex with Ms Altice.

The trial is now on hold. Ms Altice was arrested in October after admitting to having sex with the 16-year-old student during a six-month period.

The second teenager told police he had intercourse and oral sex with the ex-teacher once. Police were notified of the second case when the teen was reportedly bragging to friends.

Hopes spy plane snaps missing girls

LAGOS: Surveillance photos from US spy planes flying over Nigeria have revealed large groups of girls in a remote location – raising hopes they may be the schoolgirls abducted in April.

The *Wall Street Journal* reports US officials as saying a

July surveillance flight over northeastern Nigeria spotted a group of 60-70 girls being held in a remote field.

The location was abandoned by the time aircraft returned to confirm the sightings, the officials said.



US intelligence officials told

A story of youth at Darwin Festival

OBSERVING people, their attributes and failures, is something rising film and theatre star Hunter Page-Lochard does not take lightly.

It has helped him to craft characters, no less than in *Sugarland* – a teenage drama to premiere at Darwin Festival later this month.

“Jimmy (my character) is cheeky and has a classic approach to doing things – having the potential to do a lot but remaining lazy and insecure,” he said.

Inspiration for the script, written by Rachael Coopes and Wayne Blair (*The Sapphires*), was taken from Katherine Page-Lochard’s character is that of a boy in his rural

community, woven into the lives of two best friends as they deal with teenage life.

His observation of family helped him to prepare for the role, taking in what he has seen from his own experience.

“I have cousins identical to that ... broad spectrum of young indigenous boys in communities that are potentially great at football or at school, but because there’s no authority they don’t do it,” he said.

“I think Darwin audiences will relate to characters like Jimmy in a strong way.”

Page-Lochard is making quite the name for himself, with back to back theatre gigs seeing out the rest of 2014.

He has been signed by American talent agency Paradigm, who look after stars such as Adrien Brody, Julie Bowen and Antonio Banderas.

The hope of Hollywood stardom sits high with Page-Lochard – but the 21-year-old is still keeping it real.

“I might not be the next big thing, I just want to be part of Hollywood history,” he said.

“I’m a big advocate of *The Alchemist* by Paulo Coelho, perceive your dream and it’ll happen,” he said.

Not-so-magic fairytales

A new spin on some Grimm stories makes for a great show, writes KATINA VANGOPOULOS

A RETURN to Darwin for an Australian theatre favourite will give Ursula Yovich’s family the chance to see what she does best.

She will come home for the Darwin Festival’s run of *The Magic Hour*, a show very dear to her heart for helping revive her love of the stage.

“A few years ago I was disillusioned about the industry, doing stereotypical roles and really not involved in theatre,” she said.

“But I was approached by Deckchair Theatre about this role and I jumped at the opportunity to be a part of it.”

“It came at the right time.” That role is a one-woman show, portraying six characters from Grimm Brothers fairytales

not usually under the spotlight. Echoing Hollywood’s release on *Sleeping Beauty* villain Maleficent, Yovich’s turn in *The Magic Hour* shows a wicked retelling for grown-ups.

“These stories are really important – it’s about those forgotten, hidden voices in those that are middle to low class, those who aren’t heard,” she said.

“It’s an interesting story ... but it’s still a tale of good versus evil as most stories are.”

“Fairytales were a lesson for their time, and serve as a lesson now to be open to everyone’s story.”

The Magic Hour has been close to Yovich since the first season in Western Australia two

years ago. The current season has travelled across Australia for three months, with Darwin Festival to host the last performances.

“I think I will miss the characters because they have become a huge part of me,” Yovich said.

“But I will be ready to move on ... it’s all about the unknown.”

“I am glad my family will be able to see this show ... it’s something special, a unique piece.”

The Owls prepare to party

ROAD trips with the band on tour are often romanticised, but for drummer Matt McDonough and The Owls it really is a dream.

The four friends from Newcastle are currently on an ex-

tensive 26-show tour across three months – and the party’s only just started.

“We’ve gone through a few of those shows now,” McDonough said.

“And it’s been awesome.”

“Josh (Bailey, lead singer) and I have been mates since we were three years old, there’s 26 years worth of built-up love.”

“We’re really just having fun going from place to place.”

The Owls hit Darwin on Saturday as they make their way to the Top End for the first time, and McDonough said it could be a bit of a riot.

The choice to release another EP rather than an album was a tough decision for the group, but they are happy to still have new material for their fans.


A new album will come later down the track – for now, the Darwin show (and remainder of the tour) is at the forefront of the band’s mind.

Healthy options for men

WITH Father's Day coming up in September it's time to talk about how our men can better their health.

In Australia, the highest prevalence of cancers in men is prostate cancer, particularly in men aged over 50.

The first step is to maintain a healthy weight and to get plenty of exercise. Excess body fat can contribute to insulin resistance, which in turn can promote cancer-causing cells.

Lycopene (from tomatoes, particularly when cooked), selenium (brazil nuts are an excellent source), phytoestrogens (particularly from soy), a variety of vegetables and omega-3 fatty acids from oily fish may be of benefit in prevention.

The higher consumption of soy products and oily fish in Asian countries has been linked to reduced prevalence of cancer compared with Westernised cultures.

The proposed mechanism is that these compounds act as antioxidants, reduce inflammation, inducing the death of cancer cells or reducing growth of cancerous cells.

Despite the hype, taking supplements for any of these have not shown any benefit compared with eating real food.

On the flipside, there have been several reports linking processed meats, dairy foods and a diet high in animal fats and proteins with an increased risk of prostate cancer, so eat these products in moderation.

Given dairy foods are preventive of other cancers and a good source of protein and calcium, the benefits of getting your two to three serves each day outweigh the possible risks.

Another consideration in lessening the risk of cancer is reducing exposure to carcinogens. What does this mean?

Basically, not burning your meat, using leaner cuts of meat and, where possible, marinating your meat before putting it on the barbecue.

This ratatouille packs a punch with a heap of antioxidant-rich vegies, in particular lycopene-containing tomatoes and soybeans (phytoestrogens). It tastes terrific and can be eaten as a meal or as a side with steak and mash.

Vegetable ratatouille

INGREDIENTS

125ml (½ cup) olive oil
2 red onions, thickly sliced
1 red capsicum, cut into strips
1 yellow capsicum, cut into thin strips
2 garlic cloves, finely chopped
450g zucchini, thickly sliced
400g eggplant, coarsely chopped
300g frozen podded edamame (young green soybeans), removed from their pods, or frozen peas

2 x 400g cans diced tomatoes
1 teaspoon white sugar
½ bunch of basil, coarsely chopped
1 teaspoon chilli flakes
1-2 teaspoons white or red wine vinegar

METHOD

1. Heat oil in a heavy-based saucepan over medium heat. Add the sliced onion, capsicum and garlic.
2. Cook, stirring occasionally, for 3 minutes or until capsi-

cum softens. Add zucchini, edamame and eggplant.

3. Cook, stirring occasionally, for 2 minutes. Add the tomato and sugar. Season. Cover and simmer, stirring occasionally, for 5 minutes.

4. Uncover. Cook for about 8 minutes or until the sauce is thick and the vegetables are tender. Remove from heat and stir in the chopped basil and vinegar.

Capitalise on bigger tides to hook some reefie action

WHEN you think about it, so far this year there hasn't been the ferocity of easterlies that we experience some years in the dry season.

That's why it was so noticeable early in the week when the winds got up and a coastal wind warning was issued.

The good news is that this weekend should be just dandy, with hardly 20km winds around Darwin on Saturday and even less on Sunday.

It means you'll be able to travel some distance in your typical 5m-plus trailer boat and hopefully get stuck into some great fish.

Also good news is the tidal situation this weekend: the tides are coming off the neaps and increasing in movement as the spring tides get bigger.

There's actually nearly 5m of movement on Sunday, but that should get the reef fish biting.

Actually, reefies have been going well for weeks now, and last weekend was no exception, particularly down Dundee way.

For mackerel and other pelagics, the further out you go, the better it should be simply because water clarity will be much better out wide.

With heaps of current offshore, drift fishing the bottom will be the key to success.

If you anchor, then make sure you time your efforts for the change of the tide when the current slows and stops.

Bluewater pelagic fishing locations to consider include North Gutter, Dundee Wide and way out past the Peron Islands.

If you intend to chase Spanish mackerel, give the new Classic Bluewater lures a shot; they've been braining the mackerel off Arnhem Land of late.

For barra fishermen, Corroboree Billabong is finally starting to show some form.

A couple of guides are putting clients on to good numbers using the little Killalure 2Deadly which I've raved about in this column before.

It's that amazing lure that can be worked across the surface with a terrific "popping" sound or retrieved to swim just below the surface.

A couple of tidal rivers are still producing the odd big barra; namely, the Daly River and the Finnis River.

But for consistent barra fishing, the saltwater estuaries are where the real action has

been this dry season. I've heard endless stories of great barra fishing in Darwin Harbour, Bynoe Harbour, Shoal Bay, Leaders Creek and the mouth of the Adelaide River.

Along the coast out from

the mouth of the Daly River has also produced some wonderful barra fishing.

This all augurs well for this Sunday, in particular, because the big tides aren't too bad for Darwin Harbour.

With a 2.3m low tide at midday, it's a sweet barra scenario.

Only last weekend on tides that were just marginally lower, there were several reports of quality saltwater barra fishing in the harbour's arms.

I'd suggest you get on the water and begin fishing your favourite arm or creek by 8am, then work through until a couple of hours after the turn.

With minimal winds, most of the flats will be clear and

fishable. Work them with shallow runners and prawn imitation softies, and don't be afraid to troll the outer edge of the flats, but slowly, preferably with an electric outboard and your lure a long way back.

Investors dump Ausdrill after profit hit

MELBOURNE: Shares in Ausdrill have plunged after the mining services provider flagged another hit to its profit.

The drilling, blasting and earthmoving company has warned a recovery in the mining services industry, hit by weaker demand and falling commodity prices, will be slower than it previously expected.

Ausdrill has been reviewing the value of its assets in light of

tough conditions, and the company now expects to take a further \$60 million to \$80 million pre-tax hit to its full-year profit. That is in addition to a pre-tax impairment expense taken by Ausdrill in the first six months of the 2013-14 financial year.

The latest writedown primarily relates to the company's goodwill – the value of intangible assets including brand reputation and cus-

tomers relations. "A review of the company's longer-term forecast on the back of the recent fall in the iron ore price and continued challenging market conditions have resulted in a view being taken that the recovery of the Australian mining services sector will be slower than Ausdrill had previously anticipated," the company said.

Ausdrill also said it would be hit with a \$2.7 million tax

bill in Mali. Shares in Ausdrill dropped by as much as 16.9 per cent yesterday, before finishing 9.5 cents, or 8.9 per cent, down at 97 cents.

The company now faces a tough time luring back investors, managing partner at wealth management firm 100 Doors Peter Esho said.

The company's half-year profit was down 70 per cent from a year earlier at \$14.5 million.

Seesaw in iron ore is like history repeating

KALGOORLIE: Pilbara iron ore miner BC Iron predicts the iron ore price will head above \$US100 per tonne over the next six months as demand for the company's product remains strong.

Chief executive Morgan Ball said the recent experience of iron ore price falls and slight rebounds had been reasonably similar to 2012.

"Prices came down and discounts on tier-two iron ore crept up a bit and then they came back again, and I think we're seeing that again," Mr Ball said at the Diggers and Dealers mining conference in Kalgoorlie yesterday.

Iron ore is trading around \$US95 per tonne after dipping to \$US89 earlier in the year.

Mr Ball said around \$US90 appeared to be a natural floor, taking into account changes to Chinese domestic production.

"Admittedly it's about \$US10 to \$US15 lower than what we thought," he said.

Mr Ball believes the iron ore price will continue to creep up over the next six months.

"I'd like to think it will be above \$US100 per tonne."

He said fluctuations in the Australian dollar would be important over the next few months. A fall in the dollar and lift in the iron ore price would be a "nice combination".

Mr Ball said there was still potential to expand in the Pilbara, but for the company was focused on maintaining production of 6 million tonnes per annum at its Nullagine joint venture over the next six years.

On average BC Iron sends three ship loads to China a month. The company also touched on growth options in Brazil, with Mr Ball describing the joint exploration project as still a "small kernel of an idea".

Coles taps critic to help fix supplier disputes

SYDNEY: Coles has put one of its most prominent critics on its payroll as it works to repair its battered image over its treatment of suppliers.

Former Victorian premier Jeff Kennett, who has in the past landed the supermarket giant in hot water over misleading claims about the freshness of its bread, has been appointed as an independent arbiter to resolve disputes with suppliers.

His appointment is part of a new charter governing Coles' dealing with suppliers and comes as the retailer prepares for a lengthy trial focusing on claims it forced extra payments from 200 small suppliers to help bolster its profits.

The former premier will be paid for the part-time role but rejects any suggestion he's been bought off by the company.

"I think anyone who knows me knows that I am not going to put my reputation at risk for any stipend," he said.

"I have made sure that my terms of engagement are such that my independence is absolutely assured."

Mr Kennett said he only agreed to take on the role on the condition his findings on disputes would be binding against Coles, though not against suppliers who would be free to pursue the matter with the competition watchdog or other authorities.

"It's extraordinary, I was amazed they gave in to that," he said.

"The thing is, if they don't agree with it (a decision) then I would walk away from the gig and I would pursue it publicly against Coles or if necessary I'd take it to a higher authority,

"I am not going to put my reputation at risk for any stipend"

which may be the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission."

Suppliers affected by the program declined to comment on Mr Kennett's appointment, but vegetable growers' lobby group AUSVEG cautiously welcomed the move.

"Any attempts by supermarkets to improve relationships with their suppliers are welcome, however we will be closely monitoring the implementation of the proposed framework, to ensure that it is delivering effective outcomes for growers," spokesman Andrew White said.

Coles chief executive John Durkan said Mr Kennett was free to speak out publicly against the retailer and make his findings public.

"We accept he has articulated strong views about Coles' conduct in the past, and that he will do so when and where necessary into the future," he said.

Mr Kennett in 2012 complained to the ACCC that Coles was deceiving customers by selling foreign bread as freshly baked, which ultimately saw the supermarket giant hit with a \$3 million fine.

The ACCC is also suing Coles over the tactics it employed to extract \$16 million in rebates from small suppliers who, it claimed, had benefited from improvements to its supply chain.

Dodgy tax advice worry

CANBERRA: Tax experts are concerned Australians risk getting a raw deal on tax advice under the Abbott Government's financial planner regulations.

The Tax Institute said the regulations passed by the Senate last month allow relatively inexperienced financial planners to provide wideranging tax advice. Advisers can now gain registration under the Tax

Agents Services regime by simply joining a recognised financial adviser professional association without appropriate tax and commercial law education requirements.

"This means consumers will be at risk of receiving tax advice and services provided by inadequately qualified advisers or with out-of-date skills," the institute's president Michael Flynn warned yesterday.

Bluestone staff saved

SYDNEY: Most of the thousands of staff affected by the collapse of mining services and recruitment firm Bluestone Group have been saved from unemployment.

Hoban Recruitment has agreed to take on all Bluestone office staff and its on-hire casual staff around Australia.

Bluestone was placed into voluntary administration on Monday after efforts to seek

out merger opportunities and new funding failed.

A deal was done Tuesday to secure the positions of Bluestone workers in NSW's Hunter Valley, transferring them to other labour hire companies.

Bluestone had about 3500 contract workers – such as truck drivers and machinery operators – and 180 full-time staff, across several subsidiary businesses.

Expanding the Goodlife

SYDNEY: Theme park and Goodlife gym owner Ardent Leisure is more than doubling its Western Australia fitness clubs by buying Fitness First sites in the state's capital.

The news came as Ardent flagged a healthy lift in full year profit.

The Dreamworld owner will buy eight Fitness First gyms in Perth for \$32.5 million, taking its gyms in WA to 14.

Ardent will tap investors for \$50 million to help pay for the purchase, and expand its Main Event family entertainment business in the US.

Chief executive Greg Shaw said the Fitness First purchase would boost Goodlife's ranking in the business' best-performing state. The company's stocks have been placed in a trading halt until today while the capital raising is carried out.



Cahill helps in Davidson-WBA deal Cup glory for Perth and Adelaide

AUSTRALIAN defender Jason Davidson has signed with English Premier League club West Bromwich Albion, largely thanks to Socceroos teammate Tim Cahill.

Head coach Alan Irvine has had to wait patiently for the 23-year-old left-back to resolve a contract dispute with Dutch Eredivisie club Heracles Almelo.

Davidson, who played in Australia's three World Cup group matches, believed he

had finished his contract with Heracles and had become a free agent.

Heracles, however, told him they had triggered a one-year option on that deal and he remained their player. To get the WBA contract over the line, the club paid an undisclosed fee for Davidson, who has signed a two-year deal, with an option in the club's favour for an extra season.

Irvine has confirmed speaking to former Everton star Ca-

hill, now with New York Red Bulls, for an appraisal on Davidson's skills.

Davidson said Cahill played a big part in his decision to sign with West Brom, despite the "complicated and frustrating" contractual situation.

Davidson is Irvine's seventh signing of his short reign at The Hawthorns, alongside fellow new faces Pocognoli, Craig Gardner, Joleon Lescott, Chris Baird, Brown Ideye and Andre Wisdom.

THE FFA Cup ambitions of Perth Glory and Adelaide United remain alive, with both securing wins over A-League rivals Newcastle and Wellington respectively in Tuesday's Round of 32 matches.

Two close-range goals from the Glory's Irish recruit Andy Keogh proved more than enough to quell the Jets on home turf.

Newcastle rarely managed to get going in its first competitive match under new coach

Phil Stubbins, although former Adelaide forward Jeronimo Neumann struck the crossbar in the first half with a fierce shot on his Jets debut.

Adelaide outlasted the Phoenix 1-0 thanks to a goal from Sergio Cirio on the half-hour mark at Marden.

Melbourne's St Albans edged a 1-0 win at second-tier Parramatta FC, denying the Sydney side any hope of repeating their 1990s' NSL Cup triumphs when the club was

known as Melita Eagles. In Tasmania, South Hobart suffered a tense 5-4 penalty shootout defeat against Canberra visitors Tuggeranong United after extra time had failed to separate the sides.

Meanwhile, the A-League All Stars played out a scoreless draw in a training match against Australia's U-20 side in Wollongong as they prepare for Sunday's match against Italian powerhouse Juventus at Sydney's ANZ Stadium.

Big names line up for NT outing

THERE will be WNBA stars shooting hoops in Alice Springs this November.

Women's National Basketball League outfit West Coast Waves return to the Red Centre to play the Sydney Uni Flames in the final year of a three-year deal with the NT Government.

The 2014-15 WNBL draw was released yesterday, with the Waves to host the Flames on Saturday, November 22.

The retooled Waves lineup, which boasts star imports Lindsey Moore and Cassie Harberts, along with Australian centre Louella Tomlinson, will be looking for their first win at the Traeger Park Basketball Stadium, having lost all four matches to date.

It's the fourth WNBL match played in Alice Springs and the third time the Flames will visit Central Australia.

Point guard Moore was selected in the first round of the 2013 WNBA Draft by the Minnesota Lynx and secured a WNBA championship in her first year.

A 2013 All-American for Nebraska, Moore has helped the Lynx to a 22-6 record start to sit second in the Western Conference standings.

Harberts was selected in the 2014 WNBA Draft at pick 20.

The 190cm Power Forward and 2013 World University Games gold medallist excites Waves head coach Kennedy Kereama with her excellent basketball smarts.

"I'm very excited to have secured Cassie to our roster this season. Cassie brings a very energetic, tough, skilled and intelligent brand of basketball to the Club," Kereama said.

Tomlinson joins import pair Moore and Harberts, guard Sarah Graham and returning Waves players Deanna Smith, Toni Edmondson and Darcee Garbin in making up a formidable line-up ahead of the 2014-15 season.

After winning a title with the Dandenong Rangers in her only season in the WNBL, 193cm Tomlinson has spent the past two seasons playing in Europe winning the 2013-14 Hungarian League with Pinkk Pecs, averaging 14.6 points, 6.1 rebounds and 2.9 blocks.

The Flames too will have a bright new look with former New York Liberty and Dandenong Rangers point guard Lelani Mitchell joining the squad.

Winning Waratahs challenge for coach

WALLABIES coach Ewen McKenzie admits the NSW Waratahs' Super Rugby title win has given him "selection headaches" over his backs, but has stopped short of indicating whether he'll tweak things.

Besides No.10 Bernard Foley, the Wallabies' inner and midfield backline is dominated by Brumbies players.

Nic White is the incumbent halfback, Matt Toomua wears No.12 and Tevita Kuridrani plays at outside centre.

Yet the strong performances of the Waratahs backs in Super Rugby's latter stages have presented McKenzie with a conundrum ahead of the Bledisloe Cup opener in Sydney on August 16.

Halfback Nick Phipps put on a sterling defensive effort in both the semifinal and final, Kurtley Beale lit up the park at inside centre, while No.13 Adam Ashley-Cooper's two tries in the final earned him the man-of-the-match award.

"There's always selection headaches," McKenzie said.

"The Waratahs have done a fantastic job, we recognise that, we recognise form.

"They go about their business a certain way, we do things a little bit differently.

"We'll go through the business of selections and announce a team next week."

With Nick "Honey Badger" Cummins off to Japan, it's likely Ashley-Cooper will stay on the wing for the Wallabies due to a lack of depth in the position, while Toomua's strong performances for the Brumbies should see him hold off a surge in form from Beale - who is listed in the squad as a No.10.

That leaves Phipps as the most likely Waratahs back to earn a starting spot.

Incumbent White performed extremely well for the Wallabies in the clean sweep of France in June, and was instrumental for the Brumbies in their knockout matches against the Western Force and Chiefs, but was outplayed by Phipps in the semifinal.

Clubs walk from NEAFL

THREE clubs opted out of the NEAFL competition after an AFL proposal to fund one team from the Canberra region in the competition was rejected.

As the NT News revealed yesterday, the Queanbeyan Tigers - winners of the 2012 Eastern Conference - Belconnen Magpies and Sydney Hills Eagles have withdrawn from the league, citing financial challenges as an inability to remain competitive.

It has emerged the AFL proposed each of the four Canberra-based clubs contribute \$150,000 annually to fund a new franchise from the region in its quest to reduce the league to just 10 teams.

The Tigers and Magpies initially supported the idea of a one-team proposal but didn't believe they could reach the cost demand.

The Sydney Hills Eagles, who lost to NT Thunder by 122 points in Darwin earlier this season, cited financial reasons and their own level of competitiveness as reasons for their withdrawal.

The three clubs will exit the competition with two years re-

maining on their three-year license agreement.

Financial powerhouses Ainslie - which sits in sixth place on the ladder - and Eastlake will remain in the 11-team competition in 2015.

AFL National Second Tier Manager, Simon Laughton, said that the priority for the

league was to maintain a high standard.

"When we restructured the NEAFL competition in 2013 we wanted to ensure clubs would continue to reach high standards of performance both on and off-field," he said.

"We are committed to this process, and will support clubs

to strive to achieve the high standards befitting an elite second-tier competition."

The NEAFL was introduced in 2011 and combined the AFL Queensland, Canberra and Sydney leagues, plus NT Thunder, in a two-conference format made up of 19 teams.

The league combined both the Northern and Eastern at the end of last season, cutting four clubs from Queensland while Canberra side Tuggeranong opted out.

The competition's premier objective is to provide an elite second-tier competition for AFL reserves sides from Sydney Swans, GWS Giants, Brisbane and Gold Coast.

Trailing 6-10, Malagorski showed his class and ability to draw under pressure to hit the front 14-13 and from then on never let Groenewege back into the game.

The pairs event saw father and son Todd and Geoff Brandt, from South Australia, win their first title in the Top End.

The pair won six games to get the chocolates in a field of 102 players.

The men's triples saw the Nightcliff's Lucas Baker, Scott Hollingsworth and Groenewege defeat Max Kitto, Fred Bush (Gold Coast) and Joe Rollnick (WA). This event became controversial when the winners gained maximum points in one game, which is achievable but left doubts in the minds of their opponents.

This week the NT Pennants resumes with a derby in Division 1 between Darwin Gold and Darwin Blue.

The other games are Nightcliff against Palmerston.

With one point separating Darwin Gold and Nightcliff, the premiers will not let the Darwin Blue Baggers any leniency and will seek the maximum eight points to lock Nightcliff out of top spot.

The overall strength of Darwin Gold, with Kitto and Chamberlain dominant, could see them not drop a rink and deny Nightcliff any chance of gaining top spot.

Nightcliff should prove too strong at home for Palmerston. The last time they played Palmerston salvaged a draw on one rink but the Tigers will not let this happen at home.

In division two, leaders Humpty Doo take on third-placed Darwin. This game will have a big bearing on where the teams will finish at the end of the season.

If Darwin gets maximum points, they will gain top spot and a great chance of playing off in the finals.

Darwin at home should win, but only 6-2, which would keep Humpty Doo top.

Nightcliff Black will take on Nightcliff Gold in a game that will determine the fate of both Nightcliff sides.

If Black win they will be assured of a finals berth. If Gold win, they will join Black in second position.

Unfortunately Gold will have senior players unavailable and this will enable Sue Aumann's Black side to get maximum points and a finals berth.

Palmerston take on Katherine at home and both teams are only separated by three points. Mal Trattle's Katherine sides should have too much depth for the Cockatoos and will stay in touch for a chance to finish in the top two and make the finals.

Trainer not acclaiming Notes just yet - but hoop's hopes high

THE winner of the 2015 Darwin Cup is signed and sealed, if the prophecy of popular NT jockey Wayne Davis comes true in 12 months time.

Written Notes, with Davis in the saddle, impressed in running third behind winner Design for Life (Andrew Mallyon)

and Bel Sir (Jarrod Todd) in race two over 1600m on Darwin Cup Day.

Trainer Mick Templeton, making his Darwin debut, agreed with Davis that Written Notes has huge potential.

But Templeton was a little more guarded about his chances of taking out the major prize next August.

"He just charged to the line in the open handicap mile on Cup Day," said Templeton, who set off on his marathon journey back to Moe in country Victoria yesterday.

"He was stiff not to win. Wayne was really upbeat. He said 'You have just witnessed the running of next year's Darwin Cup winner'.

"I don't know if I can get that carried away but it is very encouraging. The horse has just thrived up here.

"He has gone to a new level. "He has definitely got to come back."

Templeton believes he would change a few of his plans should he return with a team of horses in 2015.

"If I bring a three-year-old back to Darwin they have definitely got to be here earlier."

Templeton is also confident that Slew Left can be a big improver in the next 12 months.

"He should have had a run before the Guineas," he said.

He believes Slew Left was a run short for the NT Derby and it showed.

"The Derby was his distance. At the top of the straight in the Derby he was right there but faded on his run and I blame myself for that," he said.

Templeton said the hospitality shown to him by Darwin racing identities was another reason to return. "Three days ago the snow was six inches deep in Moe," he said.

Shiers cops two-month ban

CHAIRMAN of Stewards David Hensler hopes the two-month suspension handed down yesterday morning to champion jockey Paul Shiers will serve as a deterrent to other NT hoops.

Shiers had pleaded guilty to exceeding the 0.02 limit after returning a positive breath test when he arrived at Fannie Bay for the Darwin Cup meeting on Monday.

In addition to the suspension, Shiers was fined \$1000. He will be available to ride again in October.

Hensler said he hopes the penalty imposed sends a warning to other Northern Territory jockeys.

"I think it sends a clear message that we are not going to tolerate that," he said.

"Paramount is the safety of horses and riders.

"It's a high-risk sport and you have to have all your faculties when you ride."

Hensler said that the stewards meeting considered other penalties before imposing the suspension.

"Paul was shocked, remorseful and apologetic to the

stewards immediately on the day," he said. "We felt he was not in the right frame of mind on the day. He was embarrassed so we laid the charge and found him guilty.

"Today we have had submissions from him and have come up with a penalty."

He said that Shiers had conducted himself well at yesterday's hearing.

"(Shiers) has a high standing in the industry here," Hensler said.

"He conducted himself professionally throughout the hearing."

Shiers admitted to the stewards he had been drinking the night before Cup Day but did not give any other explanation.

"I was quite detailed in my findings," he said.

"Paul did say he was happy to cop the penalty on the chin.

"In my experience from riders they are wasting and different metabolisms change how alcohol is excreted from their systems.

"We will never know the exact circumstances.

"So we can only take at face value what he tells us which was that he had a few too many drinks the night before."

Hensler said jockeys were tested at five of the meetings during the Darwin Cup Carnival and Shiers was the only positive reading.

"It's a bad thing that we get a positive reading but from our perspective the welfare and safety of rider and horses is paramount and we are glad that we did not have a rider under the influence of alcohol," Hensler said.

Hensler said that he may raise the issue of a 0.02 limit set by the Australian Racing Board at an upcoming national conference of chairmen of stewards.

"I have only been the chief steward (in Darwin) for six months but it is certainly something I will bring up at the next conference bearing in mind what has happened here," Hensler said.

Shiers did not return calls from the NT News following yesterday's hearing.

Pavlich cleared for major Cat fight Injury hastens end for Winderlich

FREMANTLE skipper Matthew Pavlich is set to play in Saturday night's crunch AFL clash with Geelong after recovering from concussion.

Pavlich copped an elbow to the face in last week's win over Carlton.

Twelve days before that incident, Pavlich received a heavy knock to the head in a marking contest against St Kilda.

Fremantle coach Ross Lyon was preparing to be without Pavlich this week after the 32-year-old failed a concussion test.

But the star veteran has since passed the CogState concussion test, and Lyon is optimistic Pavlich will be able to play against the Cats at Simons Stadium.

"There's no reason why he shouldn't play, as long as he

doesn't become symptomatic later in the week."

Utility player Tendai Mzungu will miss the game due to a hamstring injury, and former Demon Colin Sylvia has been ruled out because of his own hamstring injury.

But goalsneak Michael Walters, grounded by an ankle injury since Round 3, will return to playing duties via the WAFL on Saturday.

ESSENDON veteran Jason Winderlich will retire at the end of the AFL season, saying he doesn't have another pre-season in him.

Winderlich, 29, said after back, knee and hamstring problems, he couldn't go around for another year.

"I've got a young family and I have to think about my long-term future and I think it's fair to say the body probably didn't

have another full pre-season in it," Winderlich said.

Although he's played as a defender of late his accurate kick for goal saw him carve out a successful career in the Bombers' forward line.

In his 123 games to date, since making his debut in 2003, he has kicked 78 goals.

Essendon senior coach Mark Thompson led a chorus of praise for Winderlich.

"For Licka to carve out a career he did, with all the challenges he faced, really is an incredible achievement," Thompson said.

"Over the later part of his career he's been a great leader and mentor for the younger players and he will be missed, there's no doubt about that."

Winderlich plans to fully concentrate on his recycled timber business.



the aftermath of the Commonwealth Games in Glasgow.


