

9.11 Sketch map of plans for Kulaluk published in the newsletter Bunji, No.1 1978.


## 9.12 RAAF Mirage jet crash at Kulaluk 1985.



**Above:** In 1985 a RAAF Mirage fighter jet crashed on the tidal flats of the Kulaluk bay. After the pilot ejected safely over Coconut Grove the jet skidded to a halt on the sand, as shown in the photograph. The Kulaluk monsoon forest can be seen in the background, with a stand of Casuarina trees and the fish trap at Bill Day's camp on the right. The jet was dragged out along the beach and is now displayed in the NT Aviation Museum.
