Dear ATSIC, On behalf of the people camped in the scrub on Kulaluk land I down the track from Totem Road and turn towards Ludmilla Creek). I beg for some emergency water supply. The area is exceptionally dusty and it is impossible to keep clean, wash clothes etc.

The people have lodged a complaint with The Anti-Discrimination Commission and Their complaint has been accepted on the grounds that the Darwin City Council refuses to make land available for camps and expects people to go to Kulaluk. That is, because Kulaluk is Aboriginal-owned land all Aborigines should go There says the Dec.

Also George Brown says to harass' and eventually people will go. But These people live in Darwin and have nowhere to go.

While Their complaint is being heard, which may take time, their need is absolutely urgent. Something temporary like a water tank which could be delivered immediately and topped up regularly. Of course, then there are problems of drainage to consider. Perhaps you could talk about it with George Ban bu ma or Bob Bundowabi. Jours. Sincerely

Please reconsider your order to evict the people camped on vacant Crown land at Lee Point. After lengthy hearings in 1974, the Aboriginal Land Rights Commission recognised the need for town camps. In his final report Judge Woodward hoped that by 1976 no Aborigines would be living on sufferance on vacant Crown land in Darwin and Alice Springs. The Northern Territory Government has also acknowledged the need for more town camps. The Bararra people have been at Lee Point for a long time and their claims deserve to be heard. I urge you to consult with them to find a resolution.

Re: Town Camps in Darwin

You have been quoted in the media as saying that Aboriginal people must take responsibility for their own lives. This is an excellent point to apply to the Aboriginal people who have chosen to live in Darwin. By the application of these Liberal principles and a little lateral thinking, solutions can be found to the problem for homeless Aboriginal people around the city.

Please consider carefully the following proposals based on my work amongst these communities:

- 1. **Knuckeys Lagoon Town Camp** (41 hectares). At present the title to this SPL is held by an 'umbrella' organisation (ADF). The residents are *tenants* without any incentive to improve their lot. I have been involved with these people since 1971 and I know they are interested in commercial developments of part of their land to provide an income. They could then employ a manager and improve their accommodation. To make this possible the SPL should be converted to freehold granted to an association of residents with guarantees that they continue to provide transient accommodation.
- 2. **Railway Dam**. These people are also tenants of the ADF. If freehold title was given to an association of residents they might have more incentive to negotiate over the Better Cities proposals. To announce their 'relocation' without consultation is to repeat the worst acts of the past where decisions were always made for Aborigines as wards of the state.

- 3. **Lee Point/Buffalo Creek area**. An SPL for a town camp could be converted to freehold when a community of Central Arnhem Land people is more established there. To say that 'Aborigines already have 40% of NT land' is to confuse a *need* with land rights and is a highly discriminatory statement. These people will not go away.
- 4. Casuarina Hospital area and Palmerston. The same need applies to these areas where people camp.
- 6. **Bagot.** There has to be some move to integrate the area with the suburb of Ludmilla. Most of the vacant areas could be converted to freehold so residents can plan commercial developments.
- 7. **Kulaluk**. It would be undesirable if the 301 hectare lease became a dumping ground for homeless Aborigines. Neither should development plans endanger the unique urban bushland on the lease. The living area in Coconut Grove should be converted to freehold.

The conversion to freehold cannot be compared to the vast expanses of pastoral country. The town camps are used as *living areas*. Larrakia native title claimants might have problems with these plans but an inter-Aboriginal agreement could be negotiated by the NLC. Membership and constitutions would have to be carefully thought out as for strata titles.

My interest is to see justice done to the Knuckeys Lagoon and Railway Dam residents and the homeless people living in Third World conditions around Darwin.

TRESPASS ACT

7. TRESPASS AFTER DIRECTION TO LEAVE

(1) A person who trespasses on any place and, after being directed to leave that place by an occupier or member of the Police Force acting at the request of the occupier, fails or refuses to do so forthwith or returns within 24 hours to that place, commits an offence.

Penalty \$2,000.

(2) A direction under subsection (1) may, where the trespass is on Crown land or land occupied by the Territory or the Commonwealth or a statutory corporation, be given by a member of the Police Force whether a request to act has been made by the occupier or not.

8. TRESPASS AFTER WARNING TO STAY OFF

- (1) Where a person is trespassing or has trespassed on any place, an occupier of that place may, at the time of the trespass or within a reasonable time afterwards, warn that person to stay off that place.
- Where an occupier of any place has reasonable cause to suspect that a person is likely to trespass on that place, the occupier may warn that person to stay off that place.
- (3) Where a person is convicted of an offence against this Act committed on or in respect of any place, the Court may warn that person to stay off that place.
- (4) A person who, being a person who has been warned under this section to stay off any place, unlawfully trespasses on that place within one year after the giving of the warning, commits an offence.

Penalty: \$2,000.

Dear Mr. Flaherty

Thank you for meeting with us this morning.

As we said in this morning's meeting, Lee Point is our home. We were at Lee Point for a long time. We told you that we've been at Fish Camp a little while but there are no facilities, no water or toilet, it's too hard to stay there; so we have moved back to Lee Point. At the meeting, we talked with you about being allowed to stay where we are at Lee Point. We said we are going to stay there anyway, but it will be better if we are given permission. You yourself agreed that there are no facilities at Fish Camp, and that is why we are back at Lee Point; you yourself said we've lived at Lee Point for a long time. But still you said we are legally trespassing and might be arrested if we continue to stay at Lee Point.

You said that you have no authority to make any decision about whether or not our people can stay living at Lee Point. So you said you would pass what we have said to you today, on to your people, and that what we have been talking about would go through a "process". You explained that this process would involve meetings.

One person said that it might be a good idea if two representatives from the Lee Point community were present at any meeting about whether or not we would be allowed to stay at Lee Point, and you said "Yes, that sounds like a good idea".

It was a good meeting. But it needs to be followed up by your people and ours. We want to know the names of the people who will be involved in any decisions about us staying at Lee Point. We would like to know when the first meeting of the process is. We expect that we will be invited to send someone to speak on behalf of the people of Lee Point.

It's our futures we're talking about, so of course we must be involved.

As we said, we will stay at Lee Point, our home. We want to get the process going, have meetings with your people, and work something out. This is too urgent to put off until another time. Please talk to the relevant people and arrange a meeting, as you said you would. Let us know when it is, our representatives will go and speak on our behalf, and then we will get some real communication happening.



Aborigines barred from Crown land will support anthropologist charged with Trespass.

On Tuesday 10 June at 9 am, anthropologist Bill Day will appear in the Darwin magistrate's court on two counts of 'trespass after direction to leave' on Crown land at Lee Point. Mr Day will plead not guilty.

Aborigines who were camping at Lee Point when police raided the camp on May 29 will support Mr Day wearing T shirts with the slogan "FORGIVE US OUR TRESPASSES AS WE FORGIVE THOSE WHO TRESPASS AGAINST US'.

Jacky Barakal, Angela Kelly, Len Stewart, Ronald Muluk, Denis Burns and Duncan Dennis were barred for twelve months under the Trespass Act from entering the land, along with two children.)

After the short hearing the group will be available to speak to the media outside the court.

Jacky Barakal is the longest serving delegate to the NLC. He will call for actions against government workers travelling to Aboriginal lands.

"From now on government workers had better bring their swags to Arnhem Land. We have made them welcome in the past. Many live in the best houses while Aboriginal housing is overcrowded. If Aboriginal people are not welcome in Darwin. we will not welcome government people to our land. They can sleep on the ground without a shower,"

Mr Barakal's brother died while resisting attempts by the NT Department of Lands Planning and Environment to evict him from the Lee Point camp last January.

"We burnt my brother's possessions in a ceremony at Lee Point and now I need access to the area which is important to us. How can they ban my family for twelve months? However, this is not a land claim but a <u>housing issue</u>.

Homeless Aboriginal people are being chased out of the city.", said Mr Barakal.

Note: Bill Day enrolled at the prestigious University of Western Australia at the age of 51 in 1992. In 1996 he completed a BA with first class honours in English and Anthropology. He is now a PhD anthropology student at UWA doing field work in Darwin with homeless Aboriginal people. "The conditions in the camps are such that it is impossible to be an academic without being an activist", he said today.

I refer to your letter of 14 July 1997 proposing a town camp be established on Lot 4869, Lee Point, for use by Central Arnhem Land people.

Lot 4869 is not available, nor suitable for the establishment of a town camp.

There are a number of areas of land specifically set aside for town camps in the Darwin and Palmerston region and there are large vacant areas within these sites which could be used to develop further infrastructure.

Whilst I acknowledge the Fish Camp site at Kulaluk does not have essential services, you have chosen to live at this location instead of other specifically designated sites with better services.

If it is your intention to remain at Fish Camp, I suggest you liaise with the management of the Kulaluk lease area with a view to applying to appropriate funding sources for the provision of essential services.
