CANBERRA. — The Northern Territory Government yesterday frustrated an Aboriginal land claim being heard in court— its most aggressive stand to date against Aboriginal land rights.

The Territory Government has decided to alienate several reserves and a former mission station from the 7000-square-kilometer parcel of land heing sought by the Wortumungu people cast of Tennant Creek.

The decidion was conveyed yesterday by the barrister representing the NT Government to Mr Justice Kearney, who is hearing the claim.

Under the Land Rights (Northern Territory) Act only unalienated Crown land can be claimed by Aborigines.

The NT decision means the Warumungu people can claim only the desert region surrounding the twerves and tormer mission. The Northern

The Warumunga land claim hearing in Tennant Creek was adjourned yesterday after NT Government moves to alienate eight areas — including the Devil's Marbles reserve — inside the claim area.

The allenation makes the areas unavailable for claim under the Aboriginal Landrights (NT) Act.

The hearing of the ciaim over a large area abutting the town atarted before Land Commissioner Justice Sir William Carney on Monday. It will resume on December 13 in Alice Springs.

Spokesman Mike Dillon said yesterday the CLC viewed the Government move as a "bladant attack on the land rights legislation and an act of bad faith by the Chief Minster".

Extensive legal argu-ment was likely.

ABORIGINAL LAND RIGHTS

EIGHT weeks ago, in an editorial on November 10, The Canherra Times asked the Minister for Aboriginal Affairs, Mr Wilson, why he had not announced his decisions on five recommendations by the Aboriginal Land Commissioner in the Northern Territory, Mr Justice Toohey. The recommendations reached him, on average, almost one year ago. The first eight recommendations by the commissioner were all dealt with, on average, in only 3½ months. We asked, "Do delays which are three times as long represent a change in Federal Government policy?"

Mr Wilson has remained silent. If he does not reply, we will have to assume that our suspicion, written eight weeks ago is correct. We recalled that Mr Wilson had announced in June proposed amendments to the Aboriginal Land Rights (NT) Act 1976, which would "scriously weaken the Act's commitment to the Aboriginal interest" (to quote the editorial). We suggested that Mr Wilson was delaying in order to bring pressure to bear upon the Aboriginal Land Councils, because he wanted their agreement to the amendments, which on the whole they do not want.

We suggested that Mr Wilson was hoping the still deprived Aboriginal claimants would become so impatient for the freehold title to their land that they would urge their Land Councils to accept all the amendments, simply to avoid even more delay. We recalled that Aboriginal people had become understandably angry because they had learnt to expect that the commissioner's recommendations would be accepted by the Minister. Of the first eight recommendations, six were completely accepted and two were altered in only minor ways.

Of the five outstanding recommendations, Warlmanpa, Dnguragu, Dnly River, Kaititja-Warlpiri and Roper Bar, only Daly River and Roper Bar should cause Mr Wilson any prolonged thought, because these two are a little complex. (We did not chide him about a sixth outstanding recommendation, Finniss River, because an appeal to the High Court made a decision by him impossible until its judgment was delivered early last month, almost 19 months after the recommendation.)

So now there are decisions to be announced on six recommendations. The experience of the Daguragu (or Wattie Creek) people is particularly bitter. They started the landrights movement by walking off 'Wave Hill' station in 1966. In 1975 they were granted a pastoral lease to their land, but they still lack the security of freehold, inallenable title. To prolong the anxiety of these Gurindji people and all the other peoples affected, for a political purpose, would be deplorable is that what Mr Wilson is doing?

A Threat to the Territory Economy?

1982 will go down in history as the year the Northern Territory Government abandoned all subtlety and caution in its campaign against Aboriginals.

The year has seen the government, aspiring for statebood for the Territory, launch an alliout attack on Federal Territory, launch an alliout attack on Federal and rights legislation, with the compliance of an Inept and ill-informed Federal Minister for Aburlgland Affatrs. In many areas the line of attack is reminiscent of tactics used against the Jews in the 1930-40's, an attack seeded in a lime of depression such as we are facing in Australia today. Fluge sums have been spent on questionable advertising that simply fails to tell the whole story.

Casino site was Aboriginal burial ground: coroner

DARWIN: A coroner found that the site of the muttimillion dollar Mindil Beach Hotel-Casino in Darwin was an Aboriginal burial ground.

The Coroner, Mrs Thomas, said the skeletal remains of eight bodies, which were found buried on the site near the city centre, were full-blood or part Aboriginal,

The inquest began more than two years ago after the skeletons were dug up at Mindil Beach, the site of the casino which opens next April.

Mr Ellis said according to Tiwi leg-end, Pularimpi used to walk and swim to Darwin from Bathurst Island at low tide and was reputed to have been frightened to death at the sight of a motor car in Darwin in 1921.

One researcher, using 1979 Commonwealth Employment Service data, has enculated that 32 per cent of the workforce in the town owed their jobs to the presence of Aborigines.

So there emerges from this what has been described as "welfare capitalism" and, say Happell and Wigley, "the consequent implication that any increase in Aboriginal self-sufficiency would result in the present system being threatened".

And that is what is happening. The Aborighal people are learning how to organise themselves and, in pursuance of their own goals, operate the levers and machinery of jower.

For most European Australians that's good news. But in Todd St, and indeed up in Darwin, some powerful people are worried. Perhaps the 3ystem is being threatened.



CONFERENCE WILL HEAR THE OTHER SIDE OF 'RACIAL HARMONY'

The organisation of the Darwin Aboriginal community is a challenge for southern black activists, the Brisbane Action Conference on Racism and Education is to be told today.

'The Future Is With the Blacks'

INTERVIEW: NADINE GORDIMER

In eight novels and seven collections of shart stories. Nadine Gordiner, 58, has wor sann sunes, naswon international acclaim for her sharp-edged portrayals of South African life under apart-heid. On a recent visit to New York from her native Johannesburg, Gordiner spoke with NEWSWEEK's Spencer Reiss about black hopes, white fears and the possibilities for the future. Excerpts:

REISS: How do you feel about being called a "political" writer?
GORDIMER: I think it's probably inevi-

table, not because my intention is to be table, not because my intention is to be political, but because South African life is so saturated with political meanings. It's rather like the Soviet Union or Poland. If you're writing honestly about your society, and that society is in turmoil, you become a political writer. political writer.

the customs of a British parliamentary system and the catchwords of American polities create only an illusion of justice. It's nonsense when people talk about preserving our Western democratic system. There has never been one in South Africa-it has to be created from scratch.

Q. How likely would it be for a black South Africa to continue along Western capitalist lines?

A. Not very, although that is difficult for many in the West to understand. South Africa's 20 million blacks have already experienced what appears to be a Western government and Western capitalism. It is natural that by now they should be deeply distrustful of a system they have suffered under for so long.

Q. Does white South Africa realize

that its time may be growing short?

A. Five years ago, I would have been shocked by some of the things I see today-a little police station in the suburbs of Johannesburg covered by sandbags, for instance. Now, I am shocked that such sights do not disturb me. But when you see things like that-and we all do-you must begin to think.

Q. Are you hopeful about the future? A. The future will be with South Africa's blacks. They are unlike any others on the continent—better educated, more aware of the outside world, less split by tribal rivalries. That is where I pin my hopes.

Nine crew die in B-52 crash

SACRAMENTO .- An Air Force 5.52 bomber plunged into a muddy field near Mather Air Force Base yesterday, killing all nine crew members and spewing smoke and flames hundreds of metres into the

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
Kwork Kwork the Green Frog



Kwork Kwork loved the wet weather and whenever it rained she called her name to the sky, but if it was dry, she remained silent and waited for the rain to come.

Then there came a time when it did not rain for many years, and all the creeks and waterholes were dry. Kwork Kwork was very sad and finally she could not wait any longer for the rain to come, so she sent her three children into the sky. As they rose into the sky, they disappeared and dark storm clouds formed where they had been; Pumarali had changed into the lightning, Tomataka had changed into the thunder, and Pukataringa had become the rain. debated in this country today, just as they're being debated in Africa, in Asia, in Latin America and in many parts of the metropolitan world in western

Europe and in Japan because the widespread nature of the debate and its intensity at this time is a reflection of the crisis in the capitalist imperialist mode of production, Ideas and discussion do not just drop from the sky, It is not simply a plot on the part of certain individuals to engage others in a meaningless debate. Whatever the outcome of the debate. whatever the posture the different participants adopt, the very fact of the debate is representative of the crisis in capitalism and imperialism today and, as the crisis deepens, people find it more and

more difficult to accept the old modes of thought which rationalize the system which is collapsing; hence the need to search for new directions and, quite clearly, Marxism and Scientific Socialism pose themselves as one of the most obvious of the available options,
the Anglo-American tradition is one of intense hostility philosophically speaking, towards marxism, a hostility that manifests itself in a peculiar way. It manifests itself by

trying to dissociate itself even from the study of marxism. We are also, in some way, still embedded to a greater or lesser extent in the framework of bour-

geois thought, and from that framework we ask with a great degree of hesitancy

and uncertainty, what is the relevance

of marxism?
